CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

MAY 16, 2016 – 7:00 PM**

Mayor Eckert called this meeting to order.

Mayor Eckert explained the disaster procedures. Mayor Eckert reminded anyone speaking this evening to step up to a microphone because the meetings are being taped and posted the next day on the website.

Director of Economic Development advised the Edge/Laser Rock has purchased two homes for future growth. Mayor Eckert advised they have met with neighbors and met with the zoning board and everyone has signed off.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Michael Hagberg

Stated he had made comments before about TIF 10 and a possible missed payment; however, the payments have all been made and he missed the claims sheet with the payment.

Hal Inabinet

Stated he has been coming to meetings over the last year (not every meeting) and has watched a lot. All of the elected officials (16 aldermen, the Mayor and others) volunteer for election, volunteer to serve the people and in his period of attending he doesn't see that. He sees a lot of you being servants of the Keller Family, Lindenwood, companies, developers etc. You are elected to serve the people, you asked to serve the people. The people are in charge not you. Your job is to provide police protection, fire protection and infrastructure. You are not elected to provide tax breaks for everyone the shows up at city hall because these tax breaks that people are given i.e. TIFs, abatements, rebates drives our taxes up and he doesn't care what the math is he is a college educated guy and can add and subtract and he guarantees they do.

If you think a disabled veteran who gets a tax break on property taxes is the reason that property taxes go up then you are living in another world. The real world is property taxes are higher because of the millions of dollars this city has given away in tax breaks to every Tom, Dick and Harry that shows up at city council with his hand out. You will do this tonight or start the process for 6401 West Main. Then you may say you are against development...he is not. He is in favor of development and growing; however, is against corporate welfare. He does not understand why the city must given them our tax money and he has to pay more taxes to a profitable company, to a profitable developer, to a profitable non-profit. He is not against development, he is not against Lindenwood and is not against education and colleges. He thinks Lindenwood coming to Belleville is fantastic; however, some of the things they have been given are insane.

Bottom Line: Mr. Mayor and City Council he believes your business is to provide police protection, fire protection and infrastructure and it should be superb. You should use our tax money efficiently and fiscally responsible. He is not seeing that in his neighborhood. His neighborhood has 35-40 year old streets and they are falling apart. He has had three burglaries in his neighborhood in the last three months during the day.

Diane Rogge

Approximately one year ago, herself and several other Belleville residents came before this council and asked for help because their neighborhood was being infiltrated by Lindenwood University housing. Knowing that their quality of life and their neighborhoods would be changed forever they asked that a study be conducted to identify what impact this change would have on the property values. They were denied. In the last two weeks, she has spoken with appraisers regarding her property. The answer was devastating. In the city where the mayor proclaims the property values are going up...up...up she can tell you for certain that on West 'A' Street the values are going down...down...down for the taxpaying citizens.

The appraisers stated the number one reason for the loss of value is the change of use for some properties but not all. Their property is still a family home and must be appraised as such. They are currently surrounded by homes that once were family homes; however, are designated as student dwellings. They can no longer be appraised as family homes. They have no grouping for appraisals purposes, they are not apartment buildings but contain numerous unrelated adults. They are not commercial but have constant security lighting, constant student movement day and night and vehicle traffic. One appraiser compared it to picking their home up and sitting it in a completely different setting and trying to appraise using the same guidelines used in 2011.

For those of you who think this does not affect you because you live on the other side of town think again. Our family home can still be used as a comparison for your home on the other side of town bringing your values down. Before the city and this council allow any more residents to lose value in their home while a university continues to make profits she once again asks to require an impact study to see what affects this drastic change will have on unsuspecting residents. You owe it to the residents of this city to protect the largest investment of their life...their home.

Larry Betz, Representing the Belleville Historic Society

Several months ago he made a presentation to this body to make a plea to save the front half of the Abstract and Title Building immediately to the west of City Hall. He was told that it had to be demolished to accommodate plans to make City Hall ADA compliant and the architects had already developed those plans and it would be too costly to change. He would ask that the demolition cost saved by leaving the front part of the building intact would offset the costs of revised planning and therefore have the best of both worlds.

As to what the building can be used for. He has had conversations with St. Clair County Genealogical Society and they indicated they would greatly welcome that site as a home. The City has been involved in providing venues for the Labor and Industry Museum, the Koerner House...why not the Genealogical Society. The Abstract and Title Company building is a true work of art and does not deserve to wind up in a landfill. Until it is actually demolished it is not too late to alter plans and save it. Also, during the presentation he asked during the renovation of city hall you strongly consider follow the spirit of the original architect Charles King in changes that are made. At that meeting Mayor Eckert indicated that organization would be involved in the planning meetings.

He understands that design planning is underway but as of yet they have not been contacted nor involved. Within the Belleville Historical Society they have three people that are well versed in the design principals of Charles King, his architecture and feel they can have a positive influence on the design process. He has mentioned before that in the opinion of the Director of the Illinois Historic Preservation Commission this building represents the best example of mid Century modern architecture in a civic building in the entire Midwest. It deserve to be treated accordingly.

Stewart Lannert

Wandering why do the taxpayers have to pay Lindenwood \$150,000/yr. He has never gotten an answer. They have been paying since 2003 and doesn't know when it will end. 50 of the Lindenwood houses they purchased no longer have to pay property tax and Lindenwood received free land from the 29th Street railroad tracks to the first house and part of it they made into a parking lot and the other they claim is owned by Lindenwood University City Corporation.

There is not information about giving Lindenwood 12 acres in West Belleville. He was talking to a student at a tavern and he said Lindenwood seems more like a sports complex than a university. They have everything from ping pong etc. His lawyer told him he thinks Lindenwood is trying to cram as many students as possible in to the school and when they graduate they will have school debt. He knows of two students that graduated from Lindenwood and one guy got a job as a bartender. Another girl is a bartender in another tavern.

Lindenwood knew Belleville was so desperate to give the school away they let Lindenwood disregard Belleville Codes and Regulations. Lindenwood filed a false police report against him and said he was trespassing and was on tape. He had to go to the police station and post \$150 bond. Lindenwood knew they didn't have a case and didn't have him on tape. The court refunded his money; however, withheld \$15. He called Lindenwood and requested the \$15 and the next day Lindenwood put \$20 and a box of candy in his mailbox.

Larry Holland

Stated he is for Lindenwood and Art on the Square was good.

PRESENTATIONS, RECOGNITIONS & APPOINTMENTS

Presentation by Gene Norber, Economic Development Resources, on Eligibility Study for the 6401 West Main St. Marketplace Business District.

Alderman Galetti stated who will be doing the plans since it was mentioned this is a private developer; Mr. Norber stated they are requesting the council authorize the back half of their contract and have them EDR do the plans; Alderman Galetti asked if the private interest will have input; Mr. Norber stated yes. Eric Schauster stated the RFP will close on May 23rd. Eric stated the developer that is chosen will have to compensate the city.

Mr. Norber stated there are certain requirements to create a business district (1) have an analysis of eligibility; and (2) to have a business district development and/or redevelopment plan. There are certain items that must be provided in the plan; (1) you must be able to demonstrate in the plan that you have an area that qualifies; (2) you have a budget which involves discussion both on the public and private developer; and (3) there are certain findings that must be made and certain ordinances that will have to be passed. EDR does that plan document and provides draft ordinances for review from the city's legal counsel.

Alderman Kinsella stated there is confusion with the word "plan" there are actually three different steps (1) find out if it is eligible to make a business district; (2) then a plan for the business district; and (3) the individual that is chosen will make his own plans.

Mayor Eckert the city has been trying to redevelop 6401 West Main the entire time he has been mayor and they have never gotten to the point where there was enough interest to move forward; therefore, the city did not explore the business district i.e. blight. There is a person with a sincere desire to lift up the entire shopping center.

Alderman Silsby made a motion seconded by Alderman Seibert to re-appoint Mary Karban, Carol Keeley and Victoria Weygandt for a 3 year term to the Library Board.

Alderman Hazel stated he understands neither business will produced sales tax; Eric Schauster concurred. Alderman Hazel stated his opinion of a Title Max is a predatory lending place and when asked to approve public funds he has reservations. Alderman Hazel asked Mr. Leving if his business has made any contributions to civic organizations throughout 2015; Mr. Leving stated he makes contributions every year and has similar businesses on the other side of the river i.e. senior citizens Christmas, children. Mr. Leving stated he does not do title loans they are installment loans.

Mr. Buettner stated he noticed there are two pvc pipes at the site and asked if there had been any EPA studies; Mr. Leving stated there are tanks there and there have been studies and the tanks will be filled with slurry.

Alderman Randle stated regarding the TIF eligible funds that are being expended are from the sidewalk and the driveway apron on West Main Street which is included in the TIF District; Eric Schauster concurred and advised they will be using the 50/50 program.

It has been ten months of frustration for the residents and they were promised to have a meeting with Lindenwood University and it has never happened. He hopes that the June 8th meeting does not get hijacked by the Citizens of Lindenwood and this becomes a meeting where the residents of the ward who are living on West 'A', South 27th Street, South 28th Street and South 29th Street to explain the concerns they are having and Lindenwood University will listen and addressed.

Alderman Hazel to make it a matter of record that he is voicing his concerns and his displeasure over the overuse of city departments, police department, housing department, fire department over the continual efforts by Alderman Buettner and Diane Rogge that seem to be amounting to nothing more than a witch hunt. There are issues in town that need police attention and he believes there has been charges made concerning Lindenwood.

Alderman White stated he has had communications with people in the area and they support Alderman Buettner. He recommends to cool the rhetoric and hopefully the June 8th meeting will be positive.

Alderman Pusa stated she had six calls over the weekend and not one was Lindenwood. Alderman Pusa stated all she has heard is it is a beautiful neighborhood.

Alderman Buettner stated he does not like calling the police and fire departments; however, he wishes Lindenwood would have fulfilled their promises.

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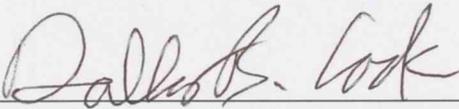
