CITY UPGRADES TO CODERED EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION

The City of Belleville has upgraded to CodeRED, a new FREE emergency notification system for our citizens, that replaces Hyper-Reach. CodeRED is a service that is provided to the citizens of Belleville at no charge, to notify them about urgent situations that may be occurring in the community.

If you were previously signed up with Hyper-Reach, your information has been transferred to CodeRED. However, we encourage you to enroll again. When you do, you will see that CodeRED offers many features that were not previously available through Hyper-Reach. Since this is a geographically based system, you must provide your street address when you register in order to receive the notification calls for any given situation.


CodeRED allows the 9-1-1 Center to quickly send a recorded message and/or text message to telephones in specific areas and alert residents to any emergency situations that require immediate action. The system delivers critical information to residents and provides guidance on what precautions need to be taken by residents during and after an incident. CodeRED is able to send notifications in five

ways: landline phone message, cell phone message, text message, TTY, and email. With CodeRED, the City can inform residents of situations such as a weather emergency, water boil advisory, a lost child, a vicious animal at large, or a street issue.

If you wish to set up your landline phone, cell phone message, text message, TTY, or your email account, registration can be completed quickly and easily by visiting the city's website at www.belleville.net and following the directions from the CodeRED link found on the home page under Belleville News.

If you do not have internet access, you can sign up for CodeRED by completing a one page application that is available at City Hall, 101 S. Illinois Street, or the Fire Administration Offices at 1125 S. Illinois Street.

In addition, once you have registered, you can download the free CodeRED Mobile Alert app to begin receiving CodeRED notifications directly to your smartphone.

new paint, an expanded meeting room, a multi media lab, and Makerspace; a DIY space where people can get together to create, invent, and learn.



TOUR DE BELLEVILLE - 10TH ANNUAL FAMILY BIKE RIDE

Hosted by the City's Parks and Recreation Department, this year's Tour de Belleville will be held on July 10, 2015 with a "Belleville Hillbillies" theme, honoring Belleville native, Buddy Ebsen, who played the part of the millionaire hillbilly, Jed Clampett.

Pre-ride festivities will begin with live music by "Straight 6 Band" from 6:15-8:15 PM, a visit from the "Hillbillies" cast of Jed, Granny, Elly May, Jethro, Jane Hathaway, and Mr. Drysdale, and a costume contest at 8:15 PM when participants can win special prizes. The ride begins at 8:30 PM on the parking lot of Union United Methodist Church, 721 E. Main Street, Belleville. Participants can choose to ride a 5 or 15 mile route.

The cost, which includes a shirt and water



bottle while supplies last, is \$16 per person through July 9th, and \$25 per person on July 10th. Registration events, raffle tickets and additional details are available by calling (618) 233-1416 or visiting www.tourdebelleville.com.

Proceeds from last year's event with 2,323 participants, will allow for the purchase and installation of two trail map kiosks along our bike trails. At a cost of over \$10,000, these informative trail kiosks will indicate trail locations

with mile markers, restroom facilities, drinking fountains, and shade shelters. Over the past nine years, proceeds totaling \$144,558.90 from Tour de Belleville events have paid for increased safety, maintenance equipment, and amenities for our trails.

COME OUT TO PLAY

On April 18th, a group of volunteers from the Illinois American Water Company assisted the Parks and Recreation staff to help fulfill their grant obligation to landscape and plant within the new nature-based play area located in Bellevue Park; Belleville's first park, established in 1922.

The new play area, adjacent to the Stone Lodge, consists of over 25,000 sq. ft. It includes an embankment slide, stepping stumps, interpretive signage regarding water fowl, fish & butterflies, a notched log stepper, log benches, a hank drum, a thunder drum, a climbing wall, rock scramble stairs, a sand play area, water pitcher hand pump with cistern, duck & fish food dispensers, a gazebo, tree



tables, drinking fountain, numerous trees, and butterfly-attracting plants & bushes. This nature-play area is an alternative to a typical playground in that it offers the opportunity for emotional, physical, and mental growth, and fosters an appreciation for environmental stewardship.

Thank you to the American Water Charitable Foundation and the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) for the grant to build the nature-based play area. Thanks also to the

individuals, community organizations, church groups and athletic team players who worked on the new play area and additional beautification projects within Bellevue Park.

9/11 MEMORIAL NEWS

When completed, the **September 11 Memorial Walkway of Southern Illinois** will be a memorial to all those who perished on September 11, 2001. A 35.25 foot long, 7,106.9 pound steel column from the fallen World Trade Center will be featured at the site, along with a tribute to Flight 93 and the Pentagon. The column was acquired by the City from the Port Authority of New York & New Jersey.

A timeline of events that occurred on September 11, 2001 will be incorporated into an educational and informative walkway that extends from the parking lot down to the artifact.

NEWS ON THE STREETS

Flood Prevention – Unobstructed ditches are an important part of flood control. If not kept free of debris, culverts can clog and water begins to back up and/or overflow, creating major problems. Debris of any kind, including leaves & grass clippings, should not be thrown into the street or upon the banks or sides of any stream, creek, lake, or any other flowing watercourse. Doing so can impede the flow of water through ditches, drainage easements, or natural drains, causing backups that result in flooding.

Oil & Chip Operations - The Street Department will conduct oil & chip operations starting August 24 and ending approximately Septem-

ber 4, utilizing IDOT approved emulsion and steel slag. Area streets scheduled for oil & chip are those in the Ogles Subdivision. Motorists are asked to observe traffic control signs and flag personnel. Signs are generally posted prior to oil & chip application, however, the exact day for a particular street cannot always be determined. Cars should be off the streets by 7:00 am. Emulsion curing time is dependent on air temperature and humidity, but usually takes 45 minutes to 1 hour. After emulsion is applied, the steel slag is spread. Motorists are asked not to drive over fresh emulsion and to exercise caution on the freshly chipped streets.

NEW DEVELOPMENT ON RT. 15

On May 26th, the City Council gave final approval on a series of tax incentives to Missionary Ventures, LLC, which will assist in the development of a 33-acre tract of land located directly across State Route 15 from the National Shrine of Our Lady of the Snows. The \$60 million development, which was first announced in October of 2014 to cost \$50 million, will include two hotels, a convention center, an exclusive to the Metro Area Hofbrauhaus Pub, an additional four restaurants and a convenience store. Construction is expected to commence by early fall on Hofbrauhaus-Belleville. Follow the progress of this new, major development at www.belleville.net.



BELLEVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT BOOSTS ISO RATING TO CLASS 2

The Belleville Fire Department (BFD) just received notice that it is ranked in the top 2% of departments nationwide during its Public Protection Classification Review this Spring. As a result of the review, the BFD received an upgrade to a Class 2 ISO rating. The Insurance Service Office (ISO) is the leading supplier of data and analytics for the property/casualty insurance industry. Most insurers use this classification for underwriting and calculating premiums for residential, commercial, and industrial properties.

During the review this spring, our city was graded on four categories including needed fire flows, emergency communications, overall fire de-

partment operations, and water supplies. Departments are ranked from Class 1 to Class 10, with a 1 meaning the department has an exemplary fire suppression program and a 10 meaning the fire suppression program does not meet the minimum ISO guidelines. Among the nearly 50,000 departments graded, only 97 have a Class 1. The BFD shares Class 2 with only 916 other departments. We are very proud of the hard work all of the BFD personnel have put into achieving this rating.

Beginning August 1, 2015, residents and businesses should check with their insurance providers to see if their rates will be affected by the new ISO rating.


