TOUR DE BELLEVILLE - FRIDAY, JULY 12

The Belleville Police Department received a POLARIS UTILITY VEHICLE from the 2012 Tour de Belleville proceeds. The Parks Board and the Tour de Belleville Committee decided to purchase a Polaris Ranger 800 EFI for the Police Department to monitor the safety of our bike trails and to use at special city events.

Through Tour de Belleville, the Belleville Parks and Recreation Department provides families and individuals with an enjoyable, recreational activity while gaining the benefits of exercise and raising money for the city. As a result of the great success of the 2012 Tour de Belleville event, with 2,412 participants, the Parks & Recreation Department purchased over \$20,000 of safety equipment to assist the city this year. In addition to the Polaris Utility Vehicle (\$8,750), the Police requested the addition of a police light package (\$1,800), and a drinking fountain (\$4,035), to be installed (\$5,700) at the Belleville Metro Link Station. We are proud to announce that over the 7 years of Tour de Belleville, \$110,276.30 of the proceeds have been spent to support safety, and purchase maintenance equipment and amenities for bike trails. This year's 8th Annual Tour de Belleville will be held

on Friday, July 12, with a "Gilligan's Island" theme: "3 HOUR TOUR". All participants stranded on the island from the shipped wrecked "SS Minnow" can enjoy the music played by the "Social Remedy" band from 6:30-8:30pm prior to the event. The "Castaway" ride lead by the SKIPPER begins at 8:30pm (new start time) with a choice of a 5 or 15 mile route. All of the festivities, which will include the crew members...The Professor, Mary Ann, Ginger, Mr. & Mrs. Howell and Gilligan... will be held at Union United Methodist Church in the rear parking lot.

PITCH, HIT AND RUN COMPETITION

On, April 16, 2013, (rain date April 18) the MLB/National Aquafina Pitch, Hit and Run Competition will be held at Laderman Park in Belleville. SPRING INTO ACTION FOR BELLEVILLE'S HISTORY

Are you passionate about the City of Belleville and its history? April is National Volunteer month and with Belleville's Bicentennial fast approaching now is the perfect time to get involved in preservation efforts. The Belleville Historic Preservation Commission is currently seeking interested residents of the city for appointment by the Mayor to fill open seats.

The BHPC was founded in 1972 by City Ordinance to designate local landmarks and historic districts and is responsible for reviewing subsequent exterior alterations to those properties per the guidelines. The appointed volunteers review applications for building alterations, new additions, construction, and demolition through a specified design review process. The BHPC also takes a lead role in educating the public with regards to the architectural and historical heritage of the community and providing residents with information related to preservation initiatives.

The BHPC meets on the Third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall. Meetings are run in a lively format that allows everyone to contribute. Ideal candidates will have experience, knowledge or a demonstrated interest in preserving the historic district and resources of the city. This may include, but is not limited to, membership in a historical society, volunteer work with a history-related organization, or experience in researching local history. Residents with professional qualifications in the fields of history, architecture, landscape architecture, architectural history, construction, real estate, planning, or a related field or discipline would be optimal members. 

ARBOR DAY

EMERALD ASH BORER

Millions of native ash trees are dying in the Midwest. Most will be killed by a tiny, metallic green beetle called the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB). The adult size of the beetle is approximately 1/2" long. EAB is spreading quickly and relentlessly. Treatments are available for individual trees, but there is no known method to

eradicate the beetles. The adult EAB beetle lays eggs on the bark of ash trees. The eggs hatch and the larvae bore under the bark creating channels eventually killing the tree. EAB only affects ash trees. For more information on EAB, please visit www.emeraldashborer.info or www.mortonarb.org.

BICENTENNIAL PARK

You are invited to attend the GRAND OPENING and RIBBON CUTTING of Bicentennial Park on Wednesday, May 1 at 10:00am. The park is located at 4811 Belleville Crossing St.

When completed, park features will include a roadway leading to the lighted parking lot, a wedding-like white and blue gazebo, an ADA fishing pier, three "tree" themed playground pieces, a spectacular art sculpture by artist Andrew Carson, and a modular restroom facility. The park will also feature paved and rustic winding surface trails throughout, and visitors may pass by a nature

garden displaying a granite monument dedicated to the Kimball family. A 40-foot bridge is under construction at the entrance of the park off the So. 17th Street corridor. The bridge is scheduled to be completed at the end of April.

PLANNING A YARD SALE?

Spring is a great time to rid basements and garages of things we no longer need. Yard Sales and Garage Sales are a popular means for discarding unwanted items.

According to our City Ordinance, these types of sales require a permit which can be obtained from the City Clerk's office. The cost of the permit is \$5 and is valid only for the particular sale and premises designated on the permit. The permit must be posted in the front yard area and is non-transferable. The permit holder must be the owner or the occupant of the premises where the sale is held. No more than three permits can be issued to any person during any

calendar year. Yard sales are limited to a period of three consecutive days and must be conducted during the period from 7:30am - 5:00pm. Yard Sale permits will not be issued to anyone with indebtedness to the City.

SOUNDS FROM THE POLICE SHOOTING RANGE

The Belleville Police Department has an outdoor shooting range located in the rear of the Waste Water Treatment Plant at the south end of the city. Police officers use this range year round at various times of the day and night for firearms training and practice. In the past, residents and passing motorists have called reporting that they have heard gunshots or

other sounds from that area and have been unaware of the location and use of the range. The range has been located there and used for many years. We certainly understand the concern from callers and they are always welcome to call the Police Department at 234-1212 to verify that the range is in use if they hear shooting sounds in the future.
