
In closing, I extend my sincere thanks to our countless sponsors, volunteers and city staff who are working tirelessly to make the Bicentennial Celebration possible.

WHITE LIGHTS FORM CANOPY OVER DOWNTOWN

There's a new look to downtown Belleville that is best seen after dusk. Nearly 1,520 white LED lights have been strung between streetlights from the intersections of 3rd and W. Main St. to Charles and E. Main St., forming a glowing canopy over a ten block section of the downtown business district.

The City paid \$25,000 for the lights; one half of the total cost of \$50,000. Downtown Development/Redevelopment contributed \$12,500, and the Belleville Main Street Organization contributed the remaining \$12,500 and paid for the necessary hardware and the first sample string of lights.

The lights were installed to add ambiance to downtown as we celebrate and commemorate Belleville's 200th Anniversary. As a secondary benefit, the additional light will

enhance the safety of the area. Before the completed downtown streetscape renovation in 2007, the original plans included these lights. Our hope is that the new lights will make Downtown even more attractive to new businesses so we can fill the remaining vacant buildings and make our downtown even more inviting to shoppers and diners.

The lights are a permanent addition and have a projected life span of 20 years, although intermittent outages are expected. The City's Street Department strung the lights and will maintain them. These additional lights will cost the City approximately \$20 per month to burn.

Thanks to the Belleville Main Street Organization and to Downtown Development/Redevelopment, and to Tom Bell from Glaenzer Electric, for assisting the City with the plans and purchase of the new lights.

LIBRARY OPEN DURING RENOVATIONS

If you have visited either library location in the last few weeks you may have noticed that the long awaited renovations have begun. Though things will be a little chaotic for a while, we are endeavoring to remain open as much as possible. Please be patient with us as we strive to make the Belleville Public Library one of the best in the State.

What should you expect in the New and Improved Library? We are doing more than just paint and carpet. We will have Brand new public computers at both locations, as well as increased functionality, including the ability to print from your personal laptop or tablet. We are developing an App for your mobile device so you can take the library with you everywhere. The new App will work on Android, Apple and Blackberry devices and will allow you a seamless interface with our 3M and overdrive downloadable collections, catalog searches and "Booklook", which will allow you to see if that book you just saw in the book store is available at the library and able to request it from the App.

We haven't forgotten about you history buffs and

genealogists. We will have two new digital microfilm readers with large screen displays. The new machines will allow you to digitally manipulate images to achieve optimal quality. You will also have multiple download options including a printed hard copy, e-mail, downloading to flash drive, or uploading to a cloud server. We are also digitizing another 20 years of the Belleville News Democrat and will soon have articles from 1902-1952 available for research.

Finally we will have available to our patrons a "MakerSpace." The Belleville Public Library will have a 3-D printer and scanner, digital conversion equipment and software so you can finally convert those old VHS tapes and LP's to digital, a high speed photo scanner so you can create that digital family album, and a green screen so you budding entrepreneurs can produce your own marketing.

We can't wait to welcome everyone to the New Belleville Public Library; the place where our "Proud History and Bright Future" is more than just a catch phrase.

CITY RECEIVES AWARDS

The Illinois Policy Institute presents Belleville with the Sunshine Award for online transparency.

The City's new and improved website, launched last August, has become a great resource to residents, businesses and visitors. Receiving the Sunshine Award indicates that the City's website gives its citizens better access to public information and allows them the opportunity to see how their money is being used. To earn the award, cities must score 80% or higher on the Illinois Policy Institute's 10-Point Transparency Checklist. Belleville scored 84.8% and is receiving the award for the first time. Ameren Illinois selects Belleville as an ActOnEnergy Most Progressive City for 2013.

This annual award acknowledges the energy-saving accomplishments of area businesses as well as the City's commitment to fostering an environment of sustainability. Seventy four of Belleville's businesses completed 143 projects between 06/01/2012 and 05/31/2013 through the ActOnEnergy program, generating energy savings of 1,256,233 kWh and 68 therms, and reducing energy costs by an estimated \$88,003 year. As a result of these energy-



saving efforts, these businesses are helping reduce harmful greenhouse gas emissions, conserving resources and improving their competitiveness, all of which benefit employees, consumers and the community as a whole.

RRCA names Belleville a 2014 Round 1 Runner Friendly Community

The Road Runners Club of America named Belleville a Runner Friendly Community because of the positive relationship between its running community and the local government, the most important selection criteria. The City's vast network of sidewalks and biking trails was also a factor in the selection. In addition, the RRCA recognized the Belleville Running Club as an important pillar of the community because of its weekly group runs.

BELLEVILLE PROHIBITS FIREWORKS

The City's Offenses Ordinance, Chapter 30, Section 1-15 Fireworks, prohibits the possession, use, display, ignition, sale, or offer to sell, of any fireworks including, firecrackers, torpedoes, Roman candles, sky rockets, or other pyrotechnics within the City.

The use of novelties such as sparklers, snakes, and snap-n-pops are allowed in Belleville at all times and can be sold everywhere, except gas stations, due to the dispensing of flammable liquids.

Professional 1.3 Pyrotechnics Fireworks require the approval of the City's Fire Chief and an extensive permit and registration with the Illinois State Fire Marshal and the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco Firearms and Explosives.

PARKS DEPARTMENT RECEIVES GRANTS

Belleville's Park & Recreation Department was recently awarded the IDNR-Open Space Lands Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) Grant totaling \$298,600 for Bicentennial Park improvements at the 21st Street entrance. These improvements will begin in 2015, and will include a large playground, pavilion, restroom and an additional trail expansion. These funds are part of Governor Pat Quinn's \$16.5 million investment to 46 Illinois parks projects across Illinois. This is a 50/50 matching grant, funded through the Real Estate Transfer Tax which is part of every property sale in Illinois.

The Metro East Parks and Recreation District (MEPRD) awarded a grant totaling \$96,250 to the Parks Department for Laderman Park lighting upgrades, including replacing the field lights on two ball diamonds and a soccer field. These field lights, originally installed in the 1970's, are utilized by many softball, baseball, rugby, football and soccer teams. The new lights will

include metal poles and complete underground wiring, and will provide quality field lighting for decades to come.

The St. Clair County Parks Commission just awarded \$28,671 for additional Bicentennial Park enhancements. A fun "caterpillar" themed addition, will be installed across from the current "tree" themed playground. This funding stems from 1/10 of 1 percent sales tax collected to improve local parks by the MEPRD.

Our major goal for the Parks & Recreation Department is to work towards the development, construction and completion of several awarded Grant projects in the next few years, in addition to the implementation of the Parks Master Plan for the bike trail extensions. Other Park Grant improvements will be seen at Jaycee Park, South Side Park, and Hough Park. We take pride in our park system of over 250 acres, and we strive to provide the proper maintenance of these areas and enhance and improve the quality of life for the people of Belleville.

PARK UPDATES

DOG PARK

Since opening on August 3, 2013, Belleville's Dog Park located in Rotary Park at 110 N. 6th Street, has approximately 400 memberships. Small and large dogs love playing on the agility equipment within the fenced 2.5 acres. Resident and non-resident memberships are available for purchase at the Parks and Recreation Department, 510 W. Main St. For everyone's safety, your dog's shot records are required for a membership.

JOSEPH A. GASS PARK

Work continues at Joseph A. Gass Park near the intersection of 10th and "C" Streets. A short walking trail has been constructed and additional trees have been planted. Future improvements will include a bicycle rack, fitness station, decorative fountain, and plant garden. NEWS FROM THE WASTEWATER DIVISION

A new process being used at the wastewater treatment facility is part of the plant upgrades. The Autothermal Thermophilic Aerobic Digestion (ATAD) system is replacing the old anaerobic digesters which required expensive external heating, used no oxygen, produced methane gas that was hazardous to handle, and produced a Class B bio-solid that is becoming very difficult and expensive to dispose of. While the anaerobic system served us well for years, there have been many advances in green technology.

The new ATAD system is aerobic (uses oxygen) and produces its own heat. The organisms in the system produce heat naturally in the breakdown of waste. The ATAD system better reduces bio-solids volume and will handle all the waste from the existing plant and the new expanded plant allowing us to use the existing tanks rather than constructing additional ones. The ATAD system is just coming on line and is operating very well. Once the system is in full operation, it will make a Class A bio-solid, the highest classification. The end product will be

very manageable, have minimal environmental impact, and be used to amend soils through land application.

We are always striving to clean our water with the smallest environmental foot print possible. With ATAD technology, we are achieving that goal.


