PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Kathy Mordini: 6 Knollwood, Belleville, 62223. I have brought a few people with me today that are in support of the project. I wanted to introduce three of them that are part of the project. We are here if you have any questions or concerns, we are here to answer those. We have Patrick Mahoney he is our Chef, and he is guiding us with the kitchen; we have Ash, she has been doing the market on the west end of town so she is helping us with the pop-ups, we are moving her into town from Collinsville, very excited to see what Belleville is doing and then Lauren, she is in charge of our event space. They are a little dream team for me, they are very experienced and very excited to be a part of this project. We are just wanting to get this approved and get moving with this.

Patrick Mahoney: 7 Vanderbilt Place, O'Fallon, IL, 62269. I am here in support of this project as a chef, cook and community member even though I live in O'Fallon. I like this project because of all the opportunities it presents for somebody like me in this industry to have the creativity and the space and some of the connections I have with other chefs who are masters of the crafts. Belleville is up and coming it has a lot of growth and prosperity and I think to bring in other chefs

and artists especially in this part of town would be a great idea and opportunity for a lot of people in those communities ties together and that is really what restaurants and whole foods does.

Ash Satterthwaite: 436 South Chestnut Street, Collinsville, 62234, but we have been trying to move to Belleville for several years. We know the perfect house. I am a local artist/entrepreneur and I have been doing the West End Indie Market, this year it is called Belleville Indie Market so it can expand and grow. We had a great response last year and we have a great response for this year for our July market. I am really excited for what is happening to Belleville. We would really like you to consider this for the whole community, for us, for who is coming, for artists like me, entrepreneurs.

Loren Doughty: 429 Shiloh Station Road, Shiloh, IL, 62269. I live in Shiloh now but, I was born and raised in Belleville from three generations of Belleville business owners, and I have lived in St. Louis for the last eleven years. I had the opportunity to see what the City was like across the river, and it is community. I think Belleville is great at building community I think we could do a little bit better by inviting other artists and young people to the City. We are the ones bringing children into the environment finding things to do for those children and those young families is really hard to find, unless you want to go to a restaurant or a bar. We are going to create something really cool for families, for young entrepreneurs, for young artists and I really just hope that everyone else can see the potential in bringing that to the area and what it can do for downtown Belleville.

Sally Farmington: 123 North Douglas Avenue Belleville, IL 62220. We have just recently moved here just a few months ago from North Carolina to be closer to family. We settled here specifically because there is so much happening in Belleville and I feel like this project is going to add to that and also artists so they have more opportunities for the artistic community to grow and flourish and it will bring people to the area, I think it will cause people who already live here to be more involved and will be a huge benefit to the area.

Shawn Hall: 201 Wabash Avenue, Belleville. My wife Dina and I moved to Belleville about eight years ago and yes something that we quickly found here is that areas lack in activity, culture, and character, to Belleville and it stood out and we quickly got involved and I know that there are a lot of maintainers for history like this City and so much culture and so much going on a lot of maintainers, but we found that there are very few visionaries. Being a visionary, sticking your neck out, taking risk, having grit it is hard to find, these are the people we need to hand over the keys to in a way and trust them to stick out their neck. We got involved with Belleville Mural Project and got to meet Kathy Mordini and Kinsey Mordini and quickly found that they are super passionate about this City. I just want to cast my support and that they are trustworthy and with this project. They are going to not just stop if the first attempt isn't what they think, they are going to perfect this project and I just want to ask you to support them and trust the visionaries that this City has.

Sharon Roerick: 608 South Jackson Street. I've got something brief I want to prepare for you in support of Kathy. Our Victorian home is a recent purchase on South Jackson Street and my family is currently investing heavily in the property and community. However, it is disheartening to see the high number of vacant and unoccupied and abandoned buildings immediately around our home and throughout the downtown area just off Main Street. So, I am here to support Kathy and Kinsey

because they are exactly the people who are creative, think out of the box and don't want to do things the same old way. If it wasn't for Kathy and Kinsey our family would not have invested in downtown Belleville I believe this City needs to attract more young people much younger than I. That is an investment in our future. Not to bring another office space or property to suddenly become an unused building. Incubators and flexible working spaces are here now in many cities in America attracting youth, ideas for growth and our future in Belleville can be a part of that too. Not just a destination party. Think beyond the usual and be progressive.

Bill Enyart: 301 Abend Street, Belleville. With several of my neighbors we have been discussing this for the last couple of days and there are four concerns about this project that I would like to lay out for you. The first concern is the process that we have now come to observe. This RFP was only open for three weeks. That is entirely an inadequate amount of time for any developer, and I have developed condos and commercial properties. That is entirely an inadequate amount of time for anyone to develop good RFP for a center project like this. Additionally, the advertising that put out the RFP was inadequate, there should have been more advertising. When we look at this property, this property is directly across the street from the Governor Koerner home. Which is the most significant historic site in the City. It is indeed one of the most historic sites in the State. It is the home of the man who nominated Abraham Lincoln for the presidency. That, while I am certainly not opposed to the development, I develop properties in this town, I believe that quadrant, that area should be developed with that in mind, the historic significance. We do not need to put in a development that does not meet what needs to be developed there. I have reviewed both of the RFP's that were presented for these projects, they are graphically stunning. There is some beautiful work put into these projects. In terms of graphic design, unfortunately, substantively I find they lack. There is no address to public safety, we have seen flash mobs in this town we have seen flash mobs in Fairview Heights, Shiloh, there was just one the other day at Circle K. I am sure the Police Chief could talk to you tonight about these flash mobs. A venue that is proposed in a historic residential neighborhood does not need flash mobs descending upon it, if one of these parties gets out of control. Additionally, there are not timelines named in the RFP and there is no consideration or inadequate consideration of the historic nature of that neighborhood contained in the RFP. We believe that first off, the process needs to be revisited and secondly the RFP needs to be revisited. We urge that the Council table this for at least sixty to ninety days, preferably ninety days in order to do two things. It would avoid the appearance of impropriety in only having one RFP submitted due to an open window of only three weeks so it would cure that problem by giving more time to consider it and secondly, it would give other potential developers the ability to submit an RFP. With a site with this historic significance, it may be wise to advertise this Statewide and see what kind of reaction we would get from it. Thirdly, the RFP as currently designed, the pavilions that are proposed to be placed in there would serve, we are afraid, as havens for the homeless. We already have a very significant problem here, that each of you are aware of, with public drunkenness, public drug abuse. I was walking our dog at like 4:00 in the afternoon three days ago and there was a gentleman behind the gazebo urinating. We do not need that moved two blocks south to these pavilions where it is going to impact on, what we like to think of as the jewel of the Historic District. Fourthly and finally, the very nature of a venue space is going to have erratic use, it is going to have different types of parties, that type of usage is not conducive to a residential neighborhood of this historic character such as we have on Abend Street. I think that it is certainly of note that the house located on the corner of Charles and Lincoln one doorway and actually backs right up to the former Farm Bureau Building, former City building, was sold in less than a day this

last weekend. They were asking nearly \$300,000, there was a bidding war and that building sold for \$25,000 more than the asking price. That home went for well in excess of \$300,000. This development needs to be thought about because the kind of development we need and want in that neighborhood is as all the previous speakers spoke about, we want to see young families. I have lived there for thirty-seven years and there has been a generational change on Abend Street, and we have young families there now. As was pointed out, this property has been vacant for many years, I do not think it is going to hurt anybody to have that property stay vacant for another ninety days while we have an adequate RFP process and while Ms. Mordini has the opportunity to correct the deficiencies in her current RFP.

Jenny Wieland: 315 Abend Street, Belleville. As Bill said we do want to see the growth and the families the one thing I will say though is when he was talking about the historic home on the corner the Koerner Home, right across the street is Charlie's Bar that has been there for years, and it didn't seem to attract any unsavory folks or people like that. What I am really here to speak about is the fact we have an opportunity to have a place for artists to gather, a marketplace that just brings young people too, I don't know if you have had the opportunity to go to Vine Street Market in O'Fallon, IL. It is fantastic, I think Belleville has that same opportunity. One of the things I heard people say, and I think Belleville will probably learn and we need to remember is COVID kept us away from each other and locked up, we need community, and we need spaces like Kathy is suggesting. We need spaces like that to gather. Art, laughter, music, community that is what keeps us healthy, right? It is a beautiful building, it is a beautiful area, gorgeous area. We bought a house on Abend because of the area, and I hope to see this new proposal as something that will help us grow.

Mayor Gregory: Jenny, I just want you to be aware, that pretty much since I took office there has been a group that has been working on a City Market. I know that we have an intern that is working on her fourth or fifth degree and she is working on the City Market is going to be in a building that we already own over here across the street from the Belleville News Democrat. We have had people in there and so it is going to be a place for vendors and artists and bakers and things that we have downtown, but we will not compete with what we have downtown, and also produce and things like this. The beauty of it is why we started assessing this is the fact that we wanted, you know Belleville started with a Heritage Society many years ago with the first farmer's market around this whole area. After meeting with Belleville Main Street many weeks ago the City Market came up and we have been working on that ever since. Which would be a place then to move some things from the outdoor market in, so you could have it all year long.

Jenny Wieland: I think that is wonderful, I think that is amazing and I will tell you when we first moved here the farmer's market used to be at the bank. It was fantastic right? The people in the van made all the bread and pastries and then they were gone. We do frequent the one that is currently there and that is wonderful. I think also to have a place for music and art, I don't think it would go all night I mean, frankly I do not see a scenario where it would go all night, but again I mean you know people want (inaudible) I live on Abend Street, and I support it.

Linda Weisenstein: 626 East Garfield Street, Belleville. I also own 620 East Garfield Street. I have spent a lot of time and a lot of money designing them and one has a business in it that is an Air BNB which is very successful, and I know when I did that all of the neighbors were asked if

they were okay with being around it, I don't think the same thing was done with this project or not. I have no problem with a business being in that building, but I think it could be a better business perhaps just because of the noise and the traffic and that sort of thing. I agree with Bill on a lot of his points, and I noticed one thing on this it says the pending review and approval from Belleville Historic Commission has already been approved and that is absolutely not true, I am on that Commission that has never happened at all. So, I just wanted to let you know I am not for it. I would like to see this tabled and people to study it a little bit more and I also like for you to look at the budget, you cannot build a restaurant or a space for that price, it is just not possible. How are you going to support it, do you have this money? Are you borrowing this money? What are you getting the building for? It does not say, so many things that are missing from this proposal that I would like to see. I love my neighborhood and we like it nice and quiet.

Mayor Gregory: I do have something to be read into the record, this is from the Gustave Koerner House Restoration Committee; Dear City Officials, We ask the proposal for 123-127 Mascoutah Avenue in the Old Belleville Historic District be viewed within the existing historic preservation ethic that was established in 1976 and has grown since that time. The Old Belleville Historic District is comprised of one hundred property owners who have dreamed of a historic neighborhood for the past 45 years. The Gustave Koerner House, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is owned by the City of Belleville has been the dream of supporters for the past 21 years. The potential buyers of 123-127 Mascoutah have a dream to bring new ideas and uses to the property. We ask that the dominant view of proposed changes be within the scope of the Historic Preservation Ordinance and the Design Guideline Manual. This request is based on questions about the various proposed uses of 123 Mascoutah – golf carts, pop-ups, kiosks, market, etc., - how will they blend within the historic preservation context. The proposed facade of 127 Mascoutah is complementary to the 1880s period of its construction; however, the design will be reviewed by the Historic Preservation Commission. The proposed uses are about fifty feet from the Koerner House. Fred and Barbara Kern were early supporters of rehabilitation of the house and hundreds of donors over the past 21 years have supported the dream of recognizing one of Belleville's early dreamers, Gustave Koerner. His dream was to eliminate slavery and protect the rights of immigrants. We ask the new dreamers blend their proposals with the older dreamers to enhance the Old Belleville Historic District. Sincerely, Jack LeChien and Molly McKinsey Co-chairs, Gustave Koerner House Committee.

Carol Bartle: Caseyville, IL. This is Stephanie Dorris, Co-Director of Art on the Square. First of all, I want to say thank you to the City because the last four days we have really tried to showcase your City. Tonight, we are bringing the original poster to the City for the 2022 show so you can hang it wherever you want. Thank you again.

Mike Johnson Home Brewing: 225 East Main Street. I live at 2713 Brookrun Drive, Belleville. I am here to speak about and against 11-D(2) regarding Specialty Licenses for alcohol. My understanding is that the reason to change to limit to five Specialty Licenses was to help curb the shutting down of Main Street for Special Events on side streets, to help create balance between retail establishments and the bar and restaurant establishments. I completely understand that; I think we all need to have balance and cannot shut the street down every weekend in excess. That being said, I do not believe that should mean limiting Special Event Licenses, I think that should be handled through the Streets and Parks Departments, so they handle those on their own, their

own process. By eliminating the Special Events Licenses themselves, you open business owners from going to other locations to sell (inaudible.) If, they do like they do in Tower Grove Farmer's Market where they have (inaudible) can beer, if I want to do that, I have to get a Special Event License for every time I did that. So if I did that once a month that goes very quickly and I would no longer be able to do the Chili Fest, the (inaudible) and that is just me so I know what you are looking at in Belleville as a whole (inaudible) some on the east side some on the west side (inaudible) I get that, but it does affect other businesses as well and I know that there is one downtown on West Main who has a cart that he brings to small events, she has a normal business license she would be a caterer she has to get a Special Event License for that day. I ask you don't pass this ordinance and pass this along to the Streets and Parks Departments for the events they see fit.

Keith Owens: 215 Abend Street, Belleville. I sent this letter today to Alderwoman Stiehl and Alderman Rothweiler concerning the proposal going into 123-127 Mascoutah Avenue. I would like to share with you some of my concerns about the purchase and proposal of this property from the City to the Avenue Team. This is no means against the Avenue Team business or shareholders, but a few concerns and questions about the proposal that is being presented tonight to City Council meeting. It appears that the community was not given ample time to create a proposal or collect resources, financial stakeholders for this project. The perception is that the Avenue Team has been working on a proposal for this property for six months and has an entire staff ready for this new venture. This information came from Kathy Mordini's personal Facebook page when she presented this proposal to the community. The perception of this proposal process makes it seem that deals have been made behind closed doors and equal access to this property has not been given to the public at large. Number two, this proposal has not gone through the Belleville Preservation Commission. This is the type of proposal that is required to go through the Commission for approval prior to going to the City Council. If the purchase and proposal is approved at the City Council meeting tonight, it could be seen as a proposal has already gone through the appropriate steps and the approval of the Commission. Then, if this proposal is approved tonight and then the representatives of the Avenue Team come to the Commission for approval of this proposal, the Commission will feel pressured to approve the proposal because it has already had City Council approval. The Commission will be viewed as the afterthought with little to no recourse of the Avenue Team if the Commission does not approve part or whole of this proposal. Third, the proposal does not give a clear business plan or timeline of completion. The proposal is a sixty plus page proposal with fifty-five pages of advertisement for the Avenue Team and five pages of vague description of what they plan for the building and adjoining property. Number four, the proposal does not give a clear-cut safety plan for this property. The proposal shares a possible use of the north side of the building at 127 Mascoutah to create permanent booths and pavilions for temporary vendors. While plans are in place for security and prevention of the homeless from moving from the pavilion on corner of Mascoutah Avenue and East Main. The surrounding neighborhood has been dealing with the homeless situation for years and I see this as an additional issue that has to be fully addressed as part of this proposal. Lastly, the proposal has not addressed the actions that will be taken by the Avenue Team to limit the additional noise and parking situation limitations that this venue will draw to this seemingly quiet neighborhood. For example, if on the street has cars parked on both sides of the street, the shallow width of the street would be very difficult for vehicles to drive down, this in turn, will make it impossible for neighbors to be able to exit their driveways. In addition, there is no start time stated on outdoor and indoor music will be completed.

These issues should be addressed in this proposal. Please know I am in full support that these properties need to be developed and excited about the enhancement of this corner of Mascoutah and Abend. I would just like these concerns and questions be known and taken into consideration prior to the vote.

Mark Harrison: 609 Devonshire, Belleville. I am here about 11-D(3) Cannabis Dispensary. I am going to be honest with you all, I think it is a great idea. Legitimately we have gas stations, we got liquor stores we got bars all over the place in this town. I can walk from my house to a bar and get a drink. I would love to be able to walk down the street, pick up some cannabis and walk back home. Or if we have a place that I can go to and I can smoke with other people who enjoy the same as me. That way I can share with the community and gather friends. Like the lady said we haven't been able to hang out. All we do now is play video games and sit at home. Why not get with our friends outside. This gentleman is trying to bring into our town right here. All the towns are making a ton of money on this, why shouldn't Belleville? We could use this money for our township, get more police, get more firefighters, get more first responders. Give them their pay help them with benefits. This would be amazing for Belleville. I just wanted to let you guys know that I am completely for this, and I hope you guys are for this too.

STREETS AND GRADES:

Alderman Randle made a motion second by Alderwoman Eros to approve Hank's Excavating & Landscaping, Inc., lowest responsive bidder in the amount of \$657,082.35 for improvements to West A Street (8th-10th and 13th-17th) which consist of resurfacing, replacement of concrete curb, entrance, and reconstruction of all sidewalks. Ramps will be constructed to ADA standards at roadway intersections. (CDBG funds).

Alderman Whitaker: Mayor, I understand the next one with the emergency repair, but I have a question on this one. I thought we had moved away from the practice of items being heard at Streets and Grades and immediately coming to Council, this was just discussed like forty-five minutes ago, is there a reason this one is being expedited to Council tonight.

Mayor Gregory: They should all be coming the week after.

City Clerk Gain-Meyer: Sal submitted both of them as emergency procedures.

City Engineer Elkott: The concern I had was the seriousness of the problem that we have with the undermining of the pavement, if we have one or two more rains (inaudible) it is my experience that I am relying on here, and I ask you folks to rely on me as well. Obviously, you are a collective body, and you can say no, if you want to wait two weeks then we will wait two weeks.

Alderman Whitaker: I understand that on the undermining for the emergency repair on the storm sewer, but does that same problem exist with the West A Street for the Hank's Excavating?

City Engineer Elkott: It does with the undermining it just happened on the same nights schedule. He is time pressured, I asked him to get the job done, quickly. I felt I needed to give him two weeks. Two weeks would be a significant amount of time, The residents that you are elected by want to see some progress on this, it is a judgement call on my part that we can give them two weeks, if we don't give them two weeks, obviously it is your privilege not to approve the two weeks but that is the reasoning behind it.

Alderman Whitaker: I appreciate that I just wanted to see some explanation on why we were deviating back. I don't want that to become a current practice again. But I do support the engineer's decisions and I will support this motion.

Members voting aye on roll call: Whitaker, Duco, Eros, Randle, Ferguson, Anthony, Ovian, Dintelman, Schaefer, Stiehl, Rothweiler, Elmore, Weygandt, Osthoff, Hazel. (15)

Alderman Randle made a motion second by Alderman Eros to approve emergency repairs to storm sewers located near 2790 Brookmeadow, 32 Marlo Drive, 323 and 327 Meadowlark Lane in an amount not to exceed \$170,000.00 and to waive formal bidding procedures (ARPA Funds).

Alderman Weygandt: I brought it up in Streets and Grades and I am going to bring it up again. This Brookmeadow, that is a contractor came in and did a terrible job, it did not get inspected, did

the job wrong and now we are getting stuck with the bill. The same with the Orchards you have problems again with the streets. Well, they poured the concrete, no rock underneath it, nothing, just on the dirt and now here we are going to get stuck with that. We need these contractors coming in should be bonded and put a bond on them for five to ten years if they do terrible work, they are going to come back and fix it, or the bond is going to pay for it instead of us paying for it all the time. We could use this money someplace else, but here we are again.

Mayor Gregory: We would all like to use it someplace else.

Alderman Weygandt: Here we are again, another project that is going to go and there is going to be another project like this behind Walmart, I know, that is all undermining, they built that subdivision back there, that is all going to collapse back there, I give it ten years. Walmart itself, spent the money upfront to slag in the ground so it would not sink, but behind there they didn't do nothing, just built it there and the streets are starting to give now. Who is going to pay for that one?

Mayor Gregory: We just had a wonderful Streets and Grades committee meeting before we came here tonight, and this was brought up. Sal Elkott and Dennis, you are both of the same mindset and so these are all good things for discussion that we really need to change some of the ways we approach things in the past and make sure that we are getting the biggest bang for our buck and stuck with something.

Alderman Weygandt: We should be on top of the job they are doing, and make sure they are doing the job right, if not, shut it down until they do the job right. Like I said, here we are stuck for another \$170,000 and the Orchards are going to be more money again. We could use this money other places on our streets in Belleville. We have to get control of this.

Mayor Gregory: You have brought up a very important item, and I am totally in favor of that.

Alderwoman Eros made a motion second by Alderwoman Schaefer to purchase 107 East "D" Street (Parcel: 08-22.0-302-012) from the St. Clair County Tax Agent in the amount of \$795.00 for demolition or in-fill project.

Alderman Ferguson made a motion second by Alderman Rothweiler to approve an amended Development Agreement with MG & FG Group, LLC for demolition and parking lot expansion at 1 North 44th Street and 4401 West Main Street.

Alderman Whitaker: Mayor this was a topic that had a lot of debate previously when it came up. Can we understand why the process is being delayed for this project and what the time extensions will be.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross. I would be happy to. The short answer is, I have seen a lot of these redevelopment agreements come back before you because of code variances and supply issues and whatever else. This is actually the environmental issue they need to let the soil settle before they move forward. So, they are asking for a two-month delay so the soil will be compacted properly.

A motion to approve FY23 Budget Amendment (encumbrance), as recommended by the Finance Director.

ORDINANCE AND LEGAL REVIEW:

Alderwoman Stiehl made a motion second by Alderman Randle to amend Title IX (General Regulations), Chapter 93 (Nuisances), Section 93.080 (Definitions).

Alderman Hazel: Could we get an explanation of the definitions being changed? It is not in the packet.

City Clerk Gain Meyer: It is in the Ordinance; this is the Motion that accompanies it. It is under 15-A. At the last Ordinance meeting Capt. Keilbach had asked if we could change some lighting and there are some things that we added to definitions, so we had to bring it back to add those. It is Ordinance #9046.

All members voted aye.

Alderwoman Stiehl made a motion second by Alderman Elmore to amend Title XI (Business Regulations), Chapter 121 (Alcoholic Beverages), Section 121.08 (Specialty Licenses).

Alderman Elmore: So, we kind of talked about this a little bit in Legal and Ordinance I believe we discussed about when a business goes off private premises and maybe set up a bar at a golf course or an example was given about a brewery doing a Farmer's Market type of event, so I am correct, that does count as one event for that license usage? That is one so now they are down to four, and then St. Pat's then down to three and that will leave them three other events if they have four other Farmer's Markets to participate in, they may never have a chance to ask for a Special Event License to something outside their business or on the sidewalk outside their business or off the sidewalk on a closed street, that is all correct?

City Attorney Hoerner: A Special Event License is for either a license, somebody wants to go off premise license and references premises outside of their original license premises. Or somebody that does not have a retail license just wants to add a Special Event like a fundraiser or one day license. We call them both Special Event Licenses but the former in context to what the State License that is called a Special Use Permit License, so you have to get that through the State and so forth. You are talking about an example for use of a current license holder wants to go off premises and will get a Special Event Permit License and they will get a Special Use Permit from the State. It would not count if they had a caterer's license, and the service of the alcohol is included with the service of food that is a separate issue. For example, if I were going to go down to a golf course and set up a bar and license elsewhere within the City that would be a Special Event License. If I were to serve food and the alcohol included with the service of the food, I would need a caterer's license.

Alderman Elmore: I agree with the five licenses, I think that is the perfect number with all the bars doing this. I think five is the right number. When we brought that up the other night and hearing another business saying I may never have a chance to do this City Market thing. So that is not considered catering.

Mayor Gregory: I do not believe the vision of the City Market is going to be selling beer or any other alcoholic beverages.

Alderwoman Schaefer: Has the vision for the City Market already been discussed with all of us? Because I am just going to say -

Mayor Gregory: Shelly we have a committee that has been working on this and we are, we will be bringing it to Council with the whole concept (inaudible someone chewing ice) so it will be presented at a Council meeting and we would vote in order to proceed on it because it is a City

owned building it would have to be submitted or involved in the skylights above and things like this, so it definitely will have to be brought before us but it is basically another part of Farmer's Market. Belleville Main Street talked to us about it, as I said, early in my administration because the situation there is they are having terrible trouble getting people to donate their time, set up those tents every morning and then take everything down and so they do not feel that the market is going as far as it could go. So that is how this discussion all began.

Alderwoman Schaefer: I understand that, but my thing is if you go to some in St. Louis, they do have microbreweries coming in and selling their product. It does draw a large number of people there, so I think we have to keep our vision - -

Mayor Gregory: Shelly we would love to have you on the committee.

Alderwoman Schaefer: We do need to keep that vision open and if that is going to cut into, I do not know if we can come up with some other license for them at that point or

Mayor Gregory: It could be an Ordinance change if the City Market does come to pass.

Alderwoman Eros: The City Market, for me, is a no go until it comes here at Council, that is just a dream and that is great, but I can tell you about the other events that we have around here they are already here. They are not just here they are in O'Fallon, and they are in Fairview and Shiloh, I mean so he is limited then, he is done if he does a City Market once a month or even like the Vine Street Market like they do theirs every Saturday and he is gone. Whoever brought it up that it should go to Jason, as far as the street closures, because that is what is bothering everybody.

Alderwoman Stiehl: That is apples and oranges. That is why we had to keep focusing in Ordinance and Legal meeting and bringing everybody back to the fact that no more than five Special Liquor Licenses for the outside. If you are inside and have a business you can sell as much as you want but if we have Chili Cook Off, Oktoberfest and those other events, those people are making their money selling on the street.

Alderwoman Eros: I understand that, but then we are limiting people.

Alderwoman Stiehl: They can do whatever they want inside.

Alderwoman Eros: But they cannot go to anything else.

Alderwoman Schaefer: I get where you are coming from, so say there was a golf tournament and they wanted to be a sponsor for them, they cannot go do that.

Alderwoman Eros: Unless they want to use one of their five.

Alderwoman Schaefer: Yes.

Attorney Hoerner: Please be reminded that this is licensing with the City of Belleville so if somebody wants to go to Vine Street Market in O'Fallon, they are going to have to go to O'Fallon to get a license this limitation does not apply.

Alderman Eros: No, I understand that I am just saying O'Fallon does their market every weekend so if we have – we have a Farmer's Market here too already, that is out there in the heat, but I mean, they cannot then. He cannot sell his alcohol, outside of his business, at the Farmer's Market on the weekend without a Specialty License, correct?

Alderman Hazel: They will have to take it to another town. Leave Belleville, that is what we are saying.

Alderman Eros: So, he is going to go someplace else, is what I am saying, and then that money goes someplace else.

Alderman Whitaker: If our concern with this was to limit the amount of times businesses are requesting street closures, that is the majority of what I have heard is the biggest complaints from and I don't represent either of the Wards up and down the areas that is having this, I am leaning to your guys expertise on that, but if that is what we are focused on doing is there a different way to say that you can only have five Special Event License that include a street closure, is there a way to do this?

Alderman Eros: I think also what is was, is they were selling during Chili Cook Off out on the street, I do not think that should happen, that is a not-for-profit thing going on then but, I get this gentlemen's point if we were having some kind of fair or something that, that is his business, it is a microbrewery, kind of like 4204 used to, he cannot do that now, in the City of Belleville. He cannot go to any event and sell his product.

Mayor Gregory: He can outside of the City of Belleville.

Alderman Eros: So, I guess we want them to go outside the City.

Mayor Gregory: We also have to remember; we are trying to set a balance between retail and bars and restaurants.

Alderman Stiehl: At the meeting, when we discussed it at Economic Development it was say there is ten to twelve bars and restaurants, five a year that is sixty or more Special Permits and that is plenty (at different times) we thought that was plenty for the City for extras events.

Mayor Gregory: (Inaudible) would be over one-hundred days of closing possible over one-hundred days of street closures.

Alderman Stiehl: The street closure idea, that is separate, when they have to hand in their paperwork for this, that is a separate venue that Jenny reviews, about the street closures.

Alderman Weygandt: I think five is plenty, and here we go again, what is it costing the City every time we close a street down? We send two guys out to put it all down, two guys to pick it back up, \$6-7-800? Free. Is the retail paying the \$800, no we are paying the \$800 to close the streets down. I've got two large restaurants/bars in my ward, I've got Cutter's and Silver Creek, Cutter's came to me the other day and said, can I close down Carlyle Avenue? I want to have an event like they do, we are not supposed to show discrimination, I want my time too. Now, where do we stop? I am just saying if, we need to start charging for these streets to be closed.

Alderwoman Eros: But the bottom line is, wasn't about a street closure for him, he is selling a product. He is a microbrewery who is trying to sell a product, he is not a bar. He is producing something. So, it is kind of like if you produce a piece of art you are going to go to fairs and you are going to want to sell that piece of art. That is where I am having, it is not about us having outdoor, I am just thinking about this gentleman who has product he is trying to sell. Not for somebody else, something he is making. What we are telling him is, I agree with the five Special Use permits, but for a gentleman like this who is producing a product, we are telling him that no he cannot go sell his product at an event, it could be a farmer's market, he cannot go sell that product, he has to go somewhere out of our town to do that.

Alderman Weygandt: Garrett could he buy a license like a Grey Eagle has to distribute beer?

Attorney Hoerner: That is separate licensing by the State for distribution.

Alderman Weygandt: Then he could distribute it anywhere, couldn't he?

Attorney Hoerner: Microbreweries it is all relative to capacity and production, I do not know enough about it, this particular license whether or not it is going to have a license for service of beer in a bar like 4204 Restaurant did or some other type of license or an annual distribution license you might be able to get a Microbrewery.

Alderman Weygandt: I was thinking maybe you could get a wholesale license.

Attorney Hoerner: If you had one of those licenses and you were able to serve his beer on the premises, you go off the premises serve at any type of anywhere, it requires a Special Event liquor license from the City and this limits that annual to five per calendar year I do not know, I am assuming about this particular one I don't know what function he would go to.

Mike Johnson: I did get a distributors license like you are asking about earlier, I could do that, but I still couldn't sell it without a separate license. Like if you go into a bar, the bar could sell it, but I would still be listed as the distributor. You don't actually sell by the glass. That aside, I think we are a little in the mud here about what the issue is. You are adding extra Ordinances for something that could be effectively controlled through the Streets and Parks Department. Which seems to me is all about traffic and all about street closures and all the things that they handle. So, give them the power to do their job and let them do what they are supposed to do and not add additional Ordinances that have far reaching issues, like you said Farmer's Markets, golf course events any sort of charity events where I want to pour my beer, I have done it. Yes, I could go out of town and do O'Fallon, but I want to be here, in my town, where my brewery is made and for my

community. Please don't hinder me just for the sake of making sure we can't shut down the streets of downtown that makes no sense, please just let the Street Department and Parks Department handle that part of it.

Alderman Rothweiler: The closure streets and special licenses are two different issues. They tend to go together at times by the bar owner asking for the street to be shut down. We talked about this in Ordinance and Legal. To shut down the street, I do not need special license all I need is the approved of the Council to do so. They are two different things. I agree with Alderman Whitaker in that is there some way we can go back and look at this. To say that a Special License in conjunction with a street closure is limited to X number, whatever that number is. Rather than a massive impact on this business and other businesses not just him, others have this issue as well.

Mayor Gregory: And we also have the retails too that need to be considered.

Alderman Randle made a motion second by Alderman Rothweiler to table the discussion for this evening and have it taken back to Ordinance and Legal for further review.

Alderman Ovian: I think it would probably behoove either you or Garrett to give Bob Graebe a call. Bob has purchased 4204 from Todd Kennedy. Now as of two weeks ago Friday, they were not brewing any of their own beer, the were not serving food I do not know what the makeup is going to be and when they are going to officially start pouring their own beer. We need to talk to them and if you table it, it gives us a chance to find out what is the story.

Attorney Hoerner: The motion to refer has precedence so you have to vote on that one first.

Alderman Elmore: We are voting on my motion to approve?

Attorney Hoerner: Under your Council rules, a tabling supersedes.

Members voting aye on roll call: Anthony, Ovian, Dintelman, Schaefer, Stiehl, Rothweiler, Elmore, Weygandt, Osthoff, Hazel, Whitaker, Duco, Eros, Randle, Ferguson. (15)

Alderwoman Stiehl made a motion second by Alderman Randle to amend Title XI (Business Regulations), Chapter 123 (Adult Use Cannabis) Section 123.008 (Adult-Use Cannabis Dispensing Organization).

Alderman Whitaker: I appreciate the income the dispensary would bring to our City I was at Zoning this was discussed heavily, and presentations made were great and I do think this has a place in our City. Where my concern lies in Section A-3 that was added which changes the way we hold the tape measure as it comes to this type of event. With such distances shall be measured linearly and shall be measured along a public path of travel from property line to property line the requirements under this provision shall not be subject to variance. The concern I have here is we are making a carve out to support a single property, but how does that affect us later on when somebody wants to put a dispensary in another area very close to a residential neighborhood, and where do we draw the line? If we are changing the way we hold the tape measure for a dispensary, are we going to change the way we hold the tape measure for a liquor license? We just had to

modify a distance because of that same thing, or does it get to where we hold the tape measure for a sex offender in our city? I know those are extreme measures, but I don't think the way to solve this problem and make this property work is changing the way we have to walk the line to make sure the distance is over what is in our Ordinance. We didn't ask to change the Ordinance to less than four hundred feet, but now instead of walking property to property we have to go down the road to find the next business road to turn left on and come back to this property. Again, I support the development of what we need in our city, I think this organization that is doing this is great, I don't feel this is the right property and because of A-3 I don't support this.

Alderman Ovian: Economic Development went ahead and adopted eight zones, none of which are based close (inaudible) as you can see on South 74th Street (inaudible) if we go ahead and adopt this this evening, what we have done has allow more not to do their due diligence. We have section 155.475 unsafe or unlawful street graphics. This should have been done therefore, the light there that hasn't been lit since I have been an Alderman prior to that, I've been an Alderman for seven years, secondly the property. You could have gone ahead and used 8237-2018, Vacant Property Ordinance to get rid of the building. We have to start enforcing the codes in order to make things work in our city. I'm sorry but we are not doing a very good job of enforcing properties so people can come to Belleville and want to stay.

Alderman Randle: I would ask the Director of Economic Development to explain the rationale of the measuring.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: We see it different ways, Sign Code, Property Maintenance Code, I have seen it done different ways. Traditionally it is intent when you talk about Zoning Ordinances and Ordinances that separate any path of usages such as issues with residential. Our Ordinances actually regulate the Adult Use Cannabis through two different sections of the Code, 123 which is Business Regulations and also through the Zoning Ordinance 163. The logic behind it was what was the intent of the Zoning Code? How do you separate that? In this property, you would have to fiscally go off the property walk around the public right-of-way before you hit the front of a residential property that in a sense could be impacted by that. That was our interpretation on the intent. That actually measured well over five hundred and seventy feet. In this particular case, you would have to run through the building, run through commercial buildings and hit the residential property, you will probably never see that. It has always been the case, as the crow flies or how you get there through the intent. I definitely understand that argument in terms of how do you separate. That is the logic behind it. We thought it met the intent of the Ordinance and that this separation was appropriate to protect the residents. The one thing that I do want to note though as you look at our Ordinance it came out of the Ordinance Committee, so it talks about the four-hundred-foot separation from a Residentially Zoned District. We have a lot of residential uses in this City that have achieved that either by being a Legal Non-Conforming Use, Grandfathered basically, or it was established through my favorite one, the Use Variance. The point I am making is those can be established residential uses in a commercially zoned district. Theoretically, the way the Ordinance is currently written, you could put a dispensary right next to a multi-family dwelling. I am not disagreeing with that, that is the way you want to measure that is good. At the very least we have to ask that that section of the code gets revisited and gets readdressed to make sure we do not get it now the other part of this is we were going to move the number of licenses from two to three, so you have a west side, central and

out on the east side if the intent of this Ordinance was to keep it on the boundaries of this city and out of the urban core than you don't want to approve this amendment. That is the logic behind the proposal.

Alderman Whitaker: I appreciate what you say and again I am not speaking in opposition of bringing these to our city but if we change an Ordinance today, we know what the affect on the property we are looking at today. We don't know what the affect is on any neighborhood the rest of us represent when the next dispensary comes in that wants to go four hundred feet by the public roadway away from one of those.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: I can tell you we do an analysis through our GIS and the impact will be minimal. We thought we would still read the original intent. I think the question becomes what was the original intent of the Ordinance? I can't answer that, I wasn't here, was it to put them on the outskirts? And did you want only two? And then how does that work? I think those are the questions that you probably want answered.

Alderman Elmore: We had meetings to discuss where the dispensaries would go and be limited to two and we have one right now as we sit here tonight, correct? This is the second one and the areas that we designated over fifteen months ago, does this second application fall in one of those areas that we predesignated as a retail dispensary store?

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: It does not. But there is interest in one of those zones.

Alderman Elmore: Regardless of the put forth your feet through a building around a corner whatever, this is not in the original sections that we preapproved.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: Correct.

Alderman Ovian: One of the things that we have not done, and God forbid if we pass this, was Belt Line and West Main Street at 4600 is my worst nightmare. Basically, we have not done a traffic study, we don't know when the peak period is or if there is no peak period. Honest to God, who is going to go ahead and direct traffic? Are you going to charge the people to go ahead and employ off-duty police officers? Who is going to go ahead and handle people running red lights?

Alderwoman Stiehl: I would like to hear from the Aldermen in that Ward.

Alderman Randle: I think what we are talking about here is important. It is amending an Ordinance as opposed to a specific location, but if you want to direct the conversation to the specific location to the questions around traffic and traffic studies, CVS Pharmacy has the same egress and ingress as this location would have. This location had that same issue when it served as a gas station many, many decades ago. Yes, it has been vacant for a long time, we see an opportunity here to repurpose a building and I think you have in front of you on your tables tonight a conceptual drawing, if you will, of what that corner could look like. Is that area of the City kind of depressed right now, specifically because of that particular building? Absolutely it is. Could this be a catalyst to use the Mayor's term from a previous meeting that could help that area? I believe that it very well could

be. It could probably spark investment with the ownership that remains with the respect to that particular plaza. The traffic issues as described here also pertain to the beauty supply store that is still under construction so many years later. I was having a conversation with Alderman Ferguson this afternoon and I told him I had a bet with myself because I can't find anybody else to take it, but I think if we approve this okay, this building could be renovated, up and running before the beauty supply store. Now I have addressed the traffic issue, I've taken a look at parking, I have had a conversation with the people from Progress Equity in terms of obtaining a parking easement from neighboring businesses there that could solve any parking issues that one might perceive could take place. The other thing I may mention to you is that this particular location is on a transit line. It offers people who don't have their own transportation a means of getting to and from that location to satisfy their prescription or other needs. Recreational, to be blunt. Other locations that we have off of South 74th Street, I went by there again this afternoon, there is no bus stop there. I don't know how many people can afford Uber and the product as well on the same trip. I would think having a location that is on a transit line benefits this city. We know that having one location is going to bring in revenue, I think that having two could add revenue to our tax base as well. The reason for adjusting or amending our Ordinance from two locations to three dispensary locations allows us to take advantage of the east end of the city as well. To the point of location, location, location so we would be on Route 15, we would be on West Main Street and the Belt Line, and we would also be, hopefully, located on the east end of town someplace that would be within the confines of the Ordinance as it is drafted this evening, if you would so choose to approve it. I understand people have objections, whether they be religious, moral objections to the use of the product, I also understand that there are objections okay from those that say you know what? Do I want to approve something that might feed somebody's addiction, I don't know if I have ever met somebody that was addicted to marijuana certainly other products, they become addicted to as well. Have I dealt with addiction within my own family? Yes, I have. I've seen what that abuse can do. But it wasn't as a result of marijuana use or cannabis use. I think there are a number of positive reasons for why we should go ahead and approve this Ordinance this evening, I understand the concerns about how we measure the thing but to the point that the Director of Economic Development made is like, you can't move a building in order to get that out of the way so you can count line of site to it so if you are thinking as the crow flies none of us here and fly. You have to take the path. That path gets you to almost five hundred and eight feet. Those are my remarks this evening.

Alderman Ferguson: What I want to say is I respect everything that Alderman Randle just said, but my concerns are as I said the night of Zoning was traffic, the accessibility, the parking, the location of that intersection, I am not sure that this is a plus for that intersection. Hearing Alderman Whitaker tonight the precedent that would be set in always trying to remap things to make it work, when do we stop with that? When, it just seems to start a precedent. I am not very comfortable, I am not a cannabis user and as we all know, I do work at a church, so I work with people who struggle with addictions, and this is something that many people do struggle with. It is something that I am struggling with in the decision process, I understand the revenue it will bring into the City, and I have spoken to these people who are wanting to open this business up, they know where I stand with this. I am not in support of it.

Alderman Whitaker: I have questions for Director Cross. If this location doesn't work out, do you have the ability to work with this group to help them find a home in Belleville.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: Correct, I can talk to them because the licenses, so the way the State of Illinois does it is, they issue so many licenses through the Department of Professional Regulation when it comes to the dispensaries. Department of Agricultural and the State Police handle the cultivation centers and so forth. The beauty in the way the State wrote it, the State has a lot of regulatory control, these uses are held to a higher power, and we appreciate that because they really do perform. One thing that they do do is the State does pass the siting to us and our local Ordinances and in the case regulated through two avenues of Zoning Ordinance and Business Regulations that checks as a supplementary regulation. Short answer is yes, they could theoretically look at another site. I think what I am hearing and obviously their model is their model, but what I am hearing is, and we have approved it, we approved one, we are a community that is open to a dispensary just for logistical reasons this may not be the best site in your opinion.

Alderman Whitaker: This group presented a great plan at Economic Development. They seem like a very eager group I like their conceptual drawings I am just hung on the fact of just changing our Ordinance for someone that is not them. For someone else that could come in and not have the same plan and not have the same, but I would like, if this doesn't go through, for us to work to find them a home in Belleville.

Alderwoman Osthoff: That is what I was going to ask Director Cross, if they would be interested in another location possibly?

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: Well, they have the available building.

Alderwoman Osthoff: Because on my way here, I am one hundred percent in favor of cannabis dispensaries here in Belleville, I think it will bring in great revenue I'm very excited about the one on 15. My concern is also the accessibility and on my way here I passed that and there are eight other vacant buildings on Main Street between there and 38th Street so there is opportunity to be had, but maybe not at that exact intersection because it is a nightmare, I drive it every day so do my teenage children. That would be my concern getting in and out of that particular spot. The bus line or transit line on another building on Main Street that would help people get there that can't get there any other way. I wanted to clarify, I'm the newbie.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: I drive by it all the time and you know I try to go to sites for different buildings, ironic you talk about 4204. 4204 overflow parking building would be a perfect place.

Alderwoman Osthoff: Yeah, that is exactly what on my way here I thought it wouldn't need much I wouldn't think in upgrades it is fairly new. But that is a private business decision I am just wondering if this, whatever happens tonight, if they would still want to do business in Belleville because I do think it is an economic driver, the dispensaries. I don't want to discourage that at all.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: (Inaudible) This is to the point that Alderman Randle talked about an amendment that is really not pertaining to the specific

use and I know the applicants are here and for them to comment, I think they have to do it during their case.

Attorney Hoerner: During Public Participation, but you can Director Cross this amendment is not site specific. This amendment goes to a number of licenses, limitation and goes to how the distances are described in the Ordinance are measured. Now while they resolve a problem related to an issue on site, the site-specific analysis that you do is the Special Use Permit process because cannabis dispensaries and all these cannabis uses are not permitted uses, they are special uses. This site, any other site has to apply for a Special Use Permit and at that point we take into account and consider site specific issues. I just want to keep in mind that this is broader than just this site, so if you have this is about the limitation and the number of licenses about how distances are measured. If you have site specific concerns about the site that has been discussed tonight and or any other potential site, that must be addressed in a Special Use Permit application process.

Alderman Ovian: On April 28th that Thursday evening when Zoning was held, I brought up at the Zoning meeting, you can check the minutes, this has got no business coming up before Zoning because I had a GIS study made two hundred and seventy-three feet from the nearest residence. They did not qualify. Zoning went ahead and gave them the extra leeway in order to go ahead and come before the Council. You can't have it both ways, when it says four hundred feet that's what it says in the rules. 123.008 says four hundred feet. If you are two hundred and seventy-three feet away, you don't meet the necessary requirements.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: That is not the Zoning Code. That is 123 which is Business Regulations. It clearly states that any uses not allowed will have a variance and as we talked about at the last meeting for these uses, the State of Illinois holds them, and I mean they hold them until they say you go and then you are on the chopping block. There is a lot of time sensitivity with respect to the applicants it was made very clear, you can make your Zoning application for your Special Use Permit contingent upon the understanding that you would need to have an amendment to Chapter 123 which is why it was lined up to come in this order tonight. This is the first one on the agenda before their case is even heard. They do have the right to make an application to get the Zoning Code and has to have the amendment completed prior to any action on the Zoning action which is the Special Use Permit which says it has to be consistent with 123.

Alderman Elmore: I am in favor of the retail business in the city, I am in favor of the three, I am still unclear if we had zones or areas that we predetermine was that done by Ordinance? And if it is not in one of these zones that Cliff said, if it is by Ordinance then are we breaking our own Ordinance?

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: That is predetermined by 123 and not, a combination of the distance separations is predetermined by 123, the underlining zoning is determined by 162 the C-2 Commercial Zoning which allows for the application for the Special Use Permit.

Alderman Elmore: It allows for the zones that we set up fifteen, sixteen months ago to be

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: That is a combination of 123 and 162, but that is exactly why we have to add the amendment to 123. They are eligible to make an application, I can tell them no all I want, you can't make an application, and they say I'm making an application and then bring it to the ZBA and say well they made an application, but you know what, they can't meet their distance separation, so we recommend denying. That is absolutely why we didn't just go in and say denial, that is why we went in and said they need to have an amendment to 123 before the Special Use Permit is granted.

Attorney Hoerner: 123 is the Business Licensing 162 is the Special Use Permit. They are different discussions tonight. This is an amendment to 123 that is currently on the floor and as a modification under licenses (inaudible) in the method in which the distances are measured first.

Alderwoman Stiehl: Should I read the motion again?

City Clerk Gain Meyer: There has been a motion and a second.

Alderwoman Stiehl: In our packet it refers to the change in the language. So that is what we are voting on.

Alderman Randle: Mayor, may I call for the vote please?

Members voting aye on roll call: Dintelman, Schaefer, Elmore, Hazel, Duco, Eros, Randle, Anthony (8)

Members voting nay on roll call: Ovian, Stiehl, Rothweiler, Weygandt, Osthoff, Whitaker, Ferguson (7)

Attorney Hoerner: When half the Council vote in favor of an Ordinance, Resolution or Motion even though it is not a tie vote under Section 321-40-30 the Mayor can vote.

Mayor Gregory – I vote no only because I think we need to find a better location. I too am worried about (inaudible) I also am concerned about that whole area, and I see the point of upgrading that area, which I would be in support of, but I also see where there may be opportunities and hopefully to consider the opportunities in the original Ordinance to be further out towards out away from residential.

Motion fails.

Alderman Randle: Mayor, may I call for a short recess.

Alderwoman Eros made a motion second by Alderman Ferguson to deny this request.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: For the record, we need to give them the opportunity to withdraw the request to take formal action on it, but I think he does have the opportunity as the applicant to speak on their official application and then you take whatever appropriate action you feel is appropriate.

Conor Johnston: Project Equity Illinois, I am the applicant. Like you, I actually was working in local politics, I was the Chief of Staff for London Breed in San Francisco at the time he was the President of the Board of Supervisors the equivalent of your City Council to Board of Supervisors in San Francisco. I left government after California voters passed Prop 64 to legalize adult use cannabis specifically because I saw the opportunity to bring cannabis into the light, to make it legal to make it safe, to create jobs and to create a tax. The reality is you already have cannabis sellers in your community now, you have for decades. In California we have over six billion dollars of economic activity having it checked, having it illegally by those who don't check IDs, who sell untested products, who abuse their workers, damage the environment, and don't pay taxes. You have the same type of drug dealers in this city now. What we are doing in renovating this property is an opportunity to bring that economic activity into the light and to pay taxes and to create jobs and be a part of the community. What is essential to PEI's business model is that we are for the community. We looked very closely at the oncology building which was approved two weeks ago by fourteen to one, you approved it for a cannabis seller by a company called Blounts and Moore. We looked at it and decided it didn't interest us because it was too far out of the way. Because it is not part of the community. Our stores in San Francisco have nine apartments above it in the first case and the other has two apartments above it in the same building, the very same building a multi-use building, cannabis store is on the bottom floor and residences directly above us. They love us specifically because we provide professional security during all business hours, we have cameras that monitor every direction, we are probably the safest block in the neighborhood. We are quiet, we don't have motors, we attract foot traffic to the neighboring retail businesses, and we are a positive part of the community. We have community relations liaison for each one of those stores, we have email and phone numbers that everyone in the community knows so they can reach out to that person anytime there is an issue. This building appealed to us specifically because it is part of the community. We're not interested in going to a city that wants to shun us off to the freeway in the darkness, there are already people selling cannabis in the darkness. That is not what we are interested in doing. We want to be a positive part of the community, we don't think that selling cannabis is wrong, we don't think it should be in the dark. We think this is a positive business activity and it increases safety and increases retail foot traffic, and it is a net benefit. That is why this building appealed to us. Mr. Cross stated it wasn't eligible at the time, but he thought it was feasible, a revision could be made to the way the distance was measured. I will tell you every time I have ever seen distance measured, it is usually path of travel that is generally standard

protocol, so it is not as though someone is carving out a special favor for us. But if what I am hearing tonight is that the leadership in Belleville would rather have cannabis sales hidden off on the side of the freeway, then I don't think this is the right city for us, unfortunately. We were excited to be an essential part of economic activity and to be part of the community. I don't think there is going to be a private enterprise that will be willing or capable of putting in hundreds of thousands of dollars that this building needs to rehabilitate it. So my sense is it either falls down on itself or the city buys it, but as I mentioned at the Zoning Board of Appeals there is sort of a (inaudible) China here we are only a cannabis retail, we are going to be able to invest what that building needs to make it viable again which is considerable. I recognize that there are certain people with religious opposition to cannabis, which is fine, I am not a theologian, I can't make that argument (inaudible) school graduate, but I will tell you that the questions you raised about parking and traffic are solvable problems. There are one hundred percent solvable problems. When I worked in local government, I spent a lot of time working on transportation, transportation safety, traffic flow and as I said two weeks ago, we're more than happy to invest in whatever it takes to make this site work for transportation and traffic from a management standpoint. I am already in conversations with the property manager for the adjacent property for a parking share agreement because they have a ton of parking there. I have a call scheduled for tomorrow morning so I leave the decision up to you, but I just want you to know where we are coming from and that simply changing the buildings is probably not our vision for what we think community serving cannabis should be. Thank you.

Alderman Whitaker: With the fact that we did not change the Ordinance, what are we voting on.

Attorney Hoerner: You are voting on the application for a Special Use Permit because you didn't change the Ordinance it would only be on the Business License. That is the practical aspect, this a site-specific zoning determination 162.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: Even if you approve the Special Use Permit, and they went to get the license from Jenny, she could not issue the license. In a sense it is denied by the Ordinance that was not amended. That is why the option for the applicant to withdraw the application is on the table or if the applicant does not withdraw the application the logical move then is to just deny it based upon the understanding that you cannot meet the requirements of 1.3, otherwise, even if you approved it, it would sit in hopper for a year and disappear by default.

Alderman Ovian: Sunday morning I was watching television and they were showing a display of various types of drugs that they confiscated on the southern border. One of the drugs that I could not even believe these were gummy bears laced with fentanyl. I am thinking what kind of a stupid idiot would do that to a young person? Because what you are doing is going after young school kids. How sad. It has come to where we need drug money in order to survive, sad.

Alderwoman Schaefer: That is why these organizations are wonderful because everything is medically checked, everything is regulated, they do provide security, it is a legal thing just like going to a bar and having a drink is legal if you are twenty-one. I don't particularly care for your thought that that is what these people are doing, it is not, they are providing a legal business a reputable business and they are doing things in a safe way and in the light as he said. I think there

is much to be said for it, we already have one and we are open to two others, and I don't think that our problem is we are not open to it being in the light or in our community, it is just this particular location did not work and did not set well with everyone.

Alderman Randle: My question is for the applicant. Would you like to withdraw your application?

Conor Johnston: To answer a question with a question, it sounds as if this were approved and the vote on the measurement legislation would hit again, theoretically that would allow us to move forward at this location?

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: Yes, true that would if you issue a Special Use Permit you can go and make an application, you couldn't get a license unless that amendment takes place. The problem with approving it is if you do your findings of fact one of the things that you are going to have to look at to say this is not consistent with the intent of the Zoning Ordinance that clearly says we want it to be in accordance with the 123. You have to weigh those findings of fact.

Attorney Hoerner: Practically speaking, approving this would be denying it.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: Exactly.

Alderman Rothweiler: If he withdraws it, he could come back with another application, correct? But if it is denied he has to wait a year or something?

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: Correct. Six months.

Alderman Rothweiler: I just wanted to clarify that so that he can come back.

Alderman Randle: I understand the action previously taken, okay, with warrant that we would deny this Zoning request. If you were to pull it back, remove your request the fact is that does not restart the clock with the State does it.

Conor Johnston: No, the state is on its own clock.

Alderman Randle: So, you have how long in order to exercise –

Conor Johnston: God only knows, we submitted our applications two and one-half years ago.

Alderman Randle: So, the action that we have taken previously I think makes this a moot point unless the applicant withdraws the request here. I think that the action we took previously has kind of had a negative impact in terms of them locating within the city. There were so many licenses issued by the State for the region we had two that we were fortunate enough to come and apply with the City of Belleville. We have accepted one, we are now set to deny the second. I am not sure when the occasion might present itself to offer us another opportunity somewhere down the line.

Conor Johnston: My request would be that the Council reconsider the previous item, but I do not intend to withdraw my application.

City Clerk Gain Meyer: Remember an aye vote is to deny the Special Use.

Members voting aye on roll call: Rothweiler, Elmore, Weygandt, Whitaker, Eros, Ferguson, Ovian (7)

Members voting nay on roll call: Dintelman, Schaefer, Stiehl, Osthoff, Hazel, Duco, Randle, Anthony (8)

Motion fails.

Attorney Hoerner: So now the question is there a motion to approve it.

Alderman Randle made a motion second by Alderwoman Duco to approve this request.

Attorney Hoerner: The motion to deny failed, so now there is a motion to approve. A yes vote is to approve a Special Use Permit. You all understand you already denied the amendment to the Ordinance.

Alderwoman Schaefer: It doesn't make sense. We're going to approve it, but he can't get a business license so where does it go from here? That is what doesn't make sense to me. But it doesn't have to make sense to me.

Attorney Hoerner: (Inaudible)

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: That is exactly why we would like supplementary regulations for any Zoning actions in the Zoning Ordinances and that is why we are going to start bringing those amendments to you. Because this is the kind of situation that can happen. You are comparing two different sections of Code.

Alderwoman Schaefer: We can't get another one then, right? Because that would be our number two?

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: That is a great point, no that is a great point. Since you have approved two Special Uses and you have one sitting dormant, you technically have issued two Special Uses. Although not the license. The license cannot be technically issued.

Attorney Hoerner: If you approve this permit it is going to be consistent with the vote that you took on the proposed amendment to Chapter 123.

Alderman Hazel: Which could be revisited.

Attorney Hoerner: A motion to reconsider by somebody that voted in the majority, it would have to come back through Ordinance and Legal.

Alderman Hazel: Didn't we have a precedent once before where we made a motion to reconsider without sending it back to committee.

Attorney Hoerner: The motion to reconsider would need to be made by somebody who voted in the majority. The vote on the amendment failed.

Alderman Hazel: So, we would send that back to Zoning and then it could be presented back to Council.

Alderwoman Schaefer: Ordinance and Legal.

Alderman Hazel: I mean Ordinance and Legal review.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: You can also table this item and we could look at the other Ordinance if it needs to go to be reviewed, we could talk about it at Legal and Ordinance. The problem is when you talk about Zoning, we are regulated by the State Statute in terms in land use actions and say this is withdrawn or denied and comes back in six months, we have a whole (inaudible) where if you table this thing for a month, it gives you another month to think about it. Theoretically it can go back to Legal and Ordinance that is entirely up to you.

Alderman Hazel: Is there a motion on the floor to approve?

City Clerk Gain Meyer: Yes, and a second.

Alderwoman Schaefer made a motion second by Alderman Rothweiler to table this request.

Attorney Hoerner: Under your City Council Rules, a motion to table takes precedence so you would vote on the table.

Members voting aye on roll call: Schaefer, Stiehl, Rothweiler, Elmore, Weygandt, Osthoff, Hazel, Duco, Randle, Anthony, Dintelman. (11)

Alderman Randle made a motion second by Alderman Whitaker to approve the Infill Development Program Residential Sale Contract for the property commonly known as 1008 Cart Lane.

Members voting aye on roll call: Stiehl, Rothweiler, Elmore, Weygandt, Osthoff, Hazel, Whitaker, Duco, Eros, Randle, Ferguson, Anthony, Ovian, Dintelman, Schaefer. (15)

Alderman Randle made a motion second by Alderman Anthony to approve the Infill Development Program Residential Sale Contract for the property commonly known as 24 Queensway Drive.

Members voting aye on roll call: Rothweiler, Elmore, Weygandt, Osthoff, Hazel, Whitaker, Duco, Eros, Randle, Ferguson, Anthony, Ovian, Dintelman, Schaefer, Stiehl. (15)

Alderman Randle made a motion second by Alderwoman Eros to approve/accept the conceptual plan of the Abend Street Incubator and Event Space Request for Proposal for 123-127 Mascoutah Avenue.

Alderman Rothweiler made a motion second by Alderman Elmore to table and to return it to Economic Development and Annexation for the extended period of time of sixty-days to submit proposals.

Alderman Rothweiler: I asked to table this for a couple of reasons, first of all this has nothing to do with any particular development. I did not meet with any developers, I did not meet with the current developer, nor did I ask to meet to discuss the current proposal. To keep this process reasonable. My issue was Economic Development and Annexation, and still is now, that there was insufficient advertising of this to make sure every person who was interested or proved that wanted to do this had an opportunity to do so. It was advertised on our website for three weeks, for twenty-one days, that's it. The house on Park Avenue that was announced on Facebook in multiple different things perhaps the News-Democrat could pick up on this and allow other developers who are interested in, we have one proposal. There are places that have one option all the time it is not in the United States. I would rather have other options. As you can see tonight, this is a passionate issue for the people on both sides of this. I understand the applicant wants to get on with this I am not opposed to her proposal whatsoever, I just think we should look at other options. There are other people who are against it. I would say that people who have issues with the applicant I will say this directly to them – That is your problem – the issue is what is in her application and what is in any other applications that are out there. That is what the issue is here. I just want to look and see if anyone else is interested and if they are, they need to get off of it and do it. That is why I would like to extend this period of time, table it for now let's slow this process down, we have heard from citizens on Abend Street, Garfield Street some of them have legitimate complaints here. Let's just slow this down a little bit. Whatever we do here, whoever puts in the applications for this, let us let people take a look at this and be involved in this process because this is a serious issue. It is in the Historic District, it is across from the Gustave Koerner home, which is of great historical significance, and I am not opposed to what this plan is, I am not opposed to this. It may be the plan that we pick. Maybe the residents of the neighborhood will deal with the issues, these are issues they brought up, such as parking on Abend Street. That could be a problem for this thing, I don't know. But it is an issue they brought up, let's get the community involved with this process and allow them to take a look at these proposals, whatever they be, before we just say this is what we are doing and that's it.

Alderman Hazel. I understood the Alderman to say his objection was to the process. Everything else doesn't matter. It is the process. Has a precedence been set? What is the normal process? Have we had other processes before in the same time period that this was let for? If we table this at this point, it is an undue business, it puts the applicants ideas in jeopardy because we have let for ideas

with a time table that everyone had the same timetable to get their proposals in regardless of how polished their proposals were and she submitted hers and now we go back and say you have done what was requested of you now let's publicize your idea and let everyone else to build off of that. I think that is unfair practices by this Council.

Alderman Stiehl: As the Alderman in that Ward, I agree with Chris that the process was not followed because it was put out on social media many, many weeks before anyone else had an opportunity to submit a proposal. It was put out there in a way that said I got this. A lot of people who wanted it looked at it and thought we had an inside job here and we just gave to her.

Alderman Hazel: So, you are faulting our Economic Development Department that they are not functioning appropriately?

Alderman Stiehl: No, I am not saying that at all Joe, I am saying that the process of the RFP was on a tiny little scale for such a large, beautiful area. It was three weeks on the City of Belleville website. It wasn't in the newspaper; it wasn't made public.

Alderman Hazel: We are playing by the same rules.

Alderman Stiehl: Well Economic Development did not make it public to enough people.

Mayor Gregory: I would like to say about the Facebook pages, they way the things are written on those are not totally transparent.

Alderman Stiehl: And they are bashing the Alderpeople that are trying to represent their constituents. And that's not fair.

Mayor Gregory: The fact of the matter is that this the original thing that was presented had Charlie's also involved in it, but nothing was promised to anybody. The fact of the matter is it was going out on Facebook and the way it was worded in my opinion, I have heard this from other people also, the way it was worded it seemed like a done deal. The fact of the matter is it was never a done deal, but after six or seven months of this going out, out, out, out it is kind of the same situation where people were voting on the Mural Project that you thought you were voting on murals that were going to go up on the walls. But I am just saying there is a pattern here and actually I did talk to Kathy about it, I made a point that it did have to go through our RFP and Cliff Cross our Economic Developer had also spoken with Kathy several times that it did have to go through the RFP process. The fact of the matter is the impression from being constantly there could give, and several people had said, we thought it was a done deal. Which maybe, I don't know if Mr. Owens is still here, but they had spoke to that. You know, people thought it was a done deal.

Alderman Hazel: Mayor, with all due respect, that is a problem with our process that we need to deal with, your administration needs to deal with, but this was let, the proposals came in based upon the rules that we set and was followed. It is setting a dangerous precedent whenever we let these things and people present their proposals and we may or may not agree with them and then we go back and say oh, well we didn't present it right, you followed the rules, but we're changing our rules now and we relet these things.

Mayor Gregory: Mr. Hazel, there is an Ordinance that says, would you like to address that Cliff before this.

Attorney Hoerner: I can address it. You have a project it does not even require Request For Proposals. Request For Proposals, when they are issued, always contain the language that you can reject any and all proposals for any reason. It could be that you don't get a sufficient number of proposals, it could be any reasons, and it happens, I have seen it happen with Request For Proposals and Request For Services. Maybe you put out an RFP for accounting services and you have a few one, two, three and you needed a bigger pool. But again, there is no requirement in the Municipal Code or your Ordinances that you have to conduct an RFP process that is intended to elicit proposals, there is also no requirement that you accept one just because you issued it.

Alderman Hazel: So the timetables are also arbitrary.

Attorney Hoerner: (Inaudible) it is all up to the discretion of this Council. Whether you accept it or a motion on table, I can't believe I am saying this for the third time, a motion to table takes precedence over other motions. Just keep that in mind that this is a decision that is up to the discretion of a majority of the Council.

Alderwoman Eros: That is what I was going to ask,

Alderman Elmore: Alderman Hazel asked a great question about what have we done in the past, how does this work. Alderman Weygandt and I had a project where we were asking for developers to come in, open up the structure they toured it, this went on for months and month and months. It took a long time so we have somewhat of a precedent and if we don't have one in writing, but yes, I have seen it before where the City is advertising it, we are calling contactors, yhey come look at this, we had a couple of carpenters that lived on the same block they were going to do it then they backed out, we called more developers and more carpenters just to get somebody that would sign off on letting us sell this house for a dollar just so they can spend major bucks, and they are still working on it today, but it was not only public, but we were out trying to find, we couldn't find enough people to get enough interest in it. There is a vast difference between one of the last ones I saw us do and this one. This project looks beautiful, but before I meet the chefs and all that I want to know that we are doing the best we can for our community as a whole.

Alderwoman Eros: How long does an RFP have to be advertised? Before I go on to speak on any of this can somebody answer that question? What was determined for this?

Attorney Hoerner: I don't know what that was.

Alderwoman Eros: Okay, so then Economic Development determined it was twenty-one days, and in twenty-one days this is the proposal that we got.

Mayor Gregory: They also asked for an extension.

Alderwoman Eros: We did not approve that though.

Alderwoman Schaefer: It really wasn't an extension it was because we thought more were going to be coming in the mail. Did we get any lost in the mail?

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: We have not, so to your point there is no set timeframe subject to the RFP. What we have been experiencing at the department we did our Economic Development Strategy with the move the mail has been delayed. What we want to stress is the RFP is to get the best proposal for the city. It started the factfinding process and we want to get it right. What was discussed in an ED&A meeting was do we kick it back and do an additional thirty days to repost and republish, do we recommend this, or do we just simply bring it back to the ED&A Committee to give it a little bit more time to make sure nothing slipped through the cracks. Bear in mind, anything you get tonight is just a concept. It doesn't enter into a binding agreement. We still have to tailor the contract similar to the Infill Contract with the provisions of that, what I mean by that is it may be determined that this is the job scope, this is the cost, this is the timeframe, this is the applicant passed his (inaudible) on this very similar to a subdivision. In other words, they put twenty percent down in escrow, if they don't perform, they forfeit that and it probably comes back to the city. Whoever responds to this RFP the intent is to improve that and do a concept that we approve as a whole, as a Council. We are not trying to make a profit on. Because the whole point is to secure that paper. Just get it right, that is my reason.

Alderwoman Eros: Can I finish talking? Would that be okay? I just want to speak to a couple of things that are really frustrating to listen to. Facebook is a social media platform we all have freedom of speech, nothing that was said, and believe me, I followed it all, because I think it is a great proposal. I think it is a neat, very inventive thing to bring to that area right off of Main Street and continue to broaden the scope of Belleville and things that draw people to our city with that being the Historic District. It is a beautiful place to walk in and so that draws people to the Koerner House because you know what? Nobody knows about it really; it is not done. Figuring out ways to get people to come to that and to be interested in it, maybe that brings more donors. As far as Facebook is concerned, nothing was ever said like this is a done deal. It may have appeared that way to other people but that is the way you read into it, not what she had said. I went back and I looked at it because I knew somebody was going to say that tonight. Nothing was said that way. Did she put it out there? Yes, she is trying to sell her product, she is trying to sell this proposal. Who wouldn't try to sell the proposal and get people interested in it and get some backing? Especially when she probably knows she is up against a whole lot of other things that have nothing to do with her proposal, but some other things that have come up in light, whatever that might be. I am not saying we need to move on it tonight, I am not saying waiting sixty days is a bad idea, I don't think it is a bad idea. What I am saying she followed the rules and now it feels like we are punishing her for following the rules or we are, it feels a little for me as a newbie, and I'll still be a newbie I will still call myself that, but like it just like there is some shady stuff going on that is a little underhanded and I don't understand what it is and I wish I understood more about what is really happening here and what we are really talking about.

Alderwoman Stiehl: Mayor, that is why we need to table this, because I want to address the Facebook post that was written three hours ago. From Kathy Mordini, if you can't make the City Hall meeting watch us on Welcome to Belleville page tonight. My Alderwoman wouldn't discuss it with me today. I am NOT her Alderwoman, she lives in, the address I wrote down when she spoke.

Alderman Eros: But I think she is just talking about the address where the building is that she is interested in.

Alderman Stiehl: Yes, but that is not, that is my, I am representing the people that live there and my constituents did not want this. So that is my position.

Alderman Eros: So we don't talk to people, just because our constituents don't want - - wait - - whoa whoa whoa

Alderman Stiehl: I am just saying we talk to people, but I don't really feel like get to know your Alderman because maybe they have an inside track. No, that is not what this is about. It never has been.

Alderman Whitaker: Mayor, may I address something that we haven't talked about yet, but that was brought up by one of the speakers tonight and this is probably a question for the City Attorney. There was a discussion about the requirements for this to be heard and dealt with at Historic Preservation prior to coming to Council with the opinion that a Council vote would basically supersede what they were doing. Do we have any such requirement?

Attorney Hoerner: I am not familiar with that.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: You as a Council, you hear the recommendation of the Historic Preservation.

Alderman Whitaker: But that would be like us hearing a Zoning case without it going to Zoning. That is what I am asking, is there, are we out of order here?

Alderman Stiehl: There wasn't any.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: This is what I heard from the conversations tonight; I heard National Register of Historic Places and I heard Historic District. Two different animals. National Register of Historic Places is a badge of honor at the National Register that really, standards only come into play at that point at the local level if you are the applicant trying to get Federal Funds or State Funds to do work then you are obligated to follow certain requirements. Then you have your local Historic Districts which is adopted via your local Historic Preservation Ordinance. Those are really architectural standards that you have at a local level to issue a Certificate of Appropriateness to ensure the exterior of the property meets the neighborhood and is consistent with the architectural historic significance in that neighborhood.

Alderman Eros: But they would have to do that with you when a proposal was submitted.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: It is a private entity and they came in and said I want to do this, and it is permitted by right and the underlying zoning, I cannot deny it. What I can tell them is I want to see what the exterior looks like and if it doesn't meet, it has to go to the Historic Preservation Board for them to consider, evaluate and then make

a recommendation to you as a Council as a whole. So approving the concept as a whole, it is not like that.

Alderman Whitaker: That stuff would happen after.

Mayor Gregory: I believe someone in Public Participation said that it has not gone before

Kathy Mordini: No it hasn't, we have been speaking with Jack, we have been talking to him for quite some time now and it has not gone through it, that is why the proposal says that it is pending review, so it has not been through. These are recommendations that he gave me on what he thinks it needs to be so we are expecting for him to, it needs to go through for the approval.

Mayor Gregory: We have another lady who is on Historic Preservation Council, she would like permission to speak, is that appropriate.

Alderwoman Stiehl: I would agree.

Alderwoman Eros: Didn't we have a motion to table this?

Alderman Hazel: We sure did.

Alderwoman Eros: So we have a motion and a second to table and it sounds like it needs to be tabled because we need to get other things.

Mayor Gregory: I do believe we did have

Alderman Whitaker: I call for a vote.

Attorney Hoerner: This motion to table is really cannot, as you mentioned refer back to Economic Development. The motion to table still takes precedence.

Mayor Gregory: You know what the good thing is about this? Is that we have Public Participation really improving our city and we have Aldermen who are really voicing their opinions exactly what they think and that is how government works with all of us voicing our opinions and decisions being made. I think it is a good thing that, well some of you may not agree.

Alderman Randle: I have a question, we have a motion to table and refer back to Economic Development does this motion include reopening the RFP process?

Alderman Rothweiler: I included that, yes.

Alderman Randle: For what timeframe again?

City Clerk Gain Meyer: Sixty days.

Director of Economic Development, Planning & Zoning Clifford Cross: And if I understood correctly, try and coordinate with the BND to increase the advertising. We will be happy to try and reach out and maybe to the State Historic Preservation Office and see if they can direct some thoughts to us so we can republish this to as many sites. The reason we only did the City site is that is where a lot of the bids have come through in the past. I get to your point Mayor, I think it is good that we are learning and reevaluating our process we will definitely report to ED&A even though they won't be back by the next meeting we will report to them who we post it with.

City Clerk Gain Meyer: Alderman Rothweiler would you please repeat your motion?

Alderman Rothweiler: a motion to table and return to the Economic Development and Annexation Committee to reopen the period of sixty days directing Economic Development Department to increase the coverage and reach of advertising RFP.

RESOLUTION 3445-2022

Illinois Department of Transportation
PARADE OR EVENT RESOLUTION
Effective January 1, 2017

WHEREAS, the **Southwestern Illinois Central Labor Council AFL-CIO** is sponsoring the **Labor Day Parade** in the City of Belleville which constitutes a public purpose;

WHEREAS, this **Labor Day Parade** will require the temporary closure of **IL 159 at Public Square**, a State Highway in the City of Belleville on **September 5, 2022 from 10:00 AM to 11:30 AM**;

WHEREAS, Section 4-408 of the Illinois Highway Code authorizes the Department of Transportation to issue permits to local authorities to temporarily close portions of State Highways for such public purposes.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Belleville that permission to close off **IL 159 at Public Square** on **September 5, 2022 from 10:00 AM to 11:30 AM** as above designated, be requested of the Department of Transportation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this closure shall occur during the approximate time period between **September 5, 2022 from 10:00 AM to 11:30 AM**.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that traffic from that closed portion of highway shall be detoured over routes with an all-weather surface that can accept the anticipated traffic, which will be maintained to the satisfaction of the Department and which is conspicuously marked for the benefit of traffic diverted from the State highway. (The parking of vehicles shall be prohibited on the detour routes to allow an uninterrupted flow of two-way traffic.)* The detour route shall be as follows:

* To be used when appropriate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the **City of Belleville** assumes full responsibility for the direction, protection, and regulation of the traffic during the time the detour is in effect.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that police officers or authorized flaggers shall at the expense of the **City of Belleville** be positioned at each end of the closed section and at other points (such as intersections) as may be necessary to assist in directing traffic through the detour.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that police officers, flaggers, and officials shall permit emergency vehicles in emergency situations to pass through the closed area as swiftly as is safe for all concerned.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all debris shall be removed by the **City of Belleville** prior to reopening the State highway.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such signs, flags, barricades, etc., shall be used by the **City of Belleville** as may be approved by the Illinois Department of Transportation. These items shall be provided by the **City of Belleville**.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the closure and detour shall be marked according to the Illinois Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an occasional break shall be made in the procession so that traffic may pass through. In any event, adequate provisions will be made for traffic on intersecting highways pursuant to conditions noted above. (Note: This paragraph is applicable when the Resolution pertains to a Parade or when no detour is required.)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that to the fullest extent permitted by law, the **Southwestern Illinois Central Labor Council AFL-CIO** shall be responsible for any and all injuries to persons or damages to property, and shall indemnify and hold harmless the Illinois Department of Transportation, its officers, employees and agents from any and all claims, lawsuits, actions, costs and fees (including reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses) of every nature or description, arising out of, resulting from or connected with the exercise of authority granted by the Department which is the subject of this resolution. The obligation is binding upon the **Southwestern Illinois Central Labor Council AFL-CIO** regardless of whether or not such claim, damage, loss or expense is caused in part by the act, omission or negligence of the Department or its officers, employees or agents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the **Southwestern Illinois Central Labor Council AFL-CIO** shall provide a comprehensive general liability policy or an additional named insured endorsement in the minimum amount of **\$1,000,000 per person and \$2,000,000 aggregate** which has the Illinois Department of Transportation, its officials, employees and agents as insureds and which protects them from all claims arising from the requested road closing. A copy of said policy or endorsement will be provided to the Department before the road is closed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Illinois Department of Transportation, District 8, to serve as a formal request for the permission sought in this resolution and to operate as part of the conditions of said permission.

The purpose of Metro East Pride is to advance unity, visibility and wellness among persons with diverse sexual and gender identities through cultural and educational programs, sharing of information and resources, and social activities in the Metro East area including the annual Metro East Pride Fest —celebrating the present, envisioning the future and honoring the past. As you know, June is recognized across America as Pride Month. In recognition of Pride Month, we ask the City of Belleville to display rainbow Pride flags in downtown Belleville.

Although support of and feedback regarding the rainbow Pride flags displayed in Belleville during Pride Month in 2021 was overwhelming positive, there were a few groups who opposed the flags being displayed around the Veterans Memorial Fountain. This resulted in the flags being moved away from the fountain. The City of Belleville re-positioned the flags onto North Illinois and South Illinois Street (Highway 159) as an alternative to Veterans Memorial Fountain. Metro East Pride was excited that the City of Belleville agreed to recognize Pride Month and continue to display the flags throughout the month. This decision was met with many comments on Facebook Groups including residents who expressed appreciation to the City of Belleville for recognizing Pride Month, to others who stated “It’s about time” and even residents from surrounding communities who proclaimed “I wish our community recognized Pride Month.”

We feel displaying of the rainbow Pride Flags is a win-win situation. In addition to recognizing members of the LGBTQIA community who are residents of Belleville, it also demonstrates that the City of Belleville is a progressive community and sets the standard for other communities to follow. In addition, since we donate the flags, there is very little cost to the City of Belleville yet the recognition goes a long way. We ask that the City of Belleville once again approve the display of rainbow flags in downtown Belleville. While we understand they cannot be displayed around the Veterans Memorial Fountain, we ask that they be placed on North and South Illinois Street or East and West Main Street – or any combination of these streets. We also have four special flags that are placed at the intersection of West Main and 2nd Street. The 24 flags that we donated last year are still housed at the City of Belleville Department of Public Works. If we need to assist with the review, preparation or installment of these flags, please let us know and we would be happy to provide volunteers.

Thanks you to the City of Belleville for its continued support of the LGBTQIA community and for considering our request to recognize Pride Month 2022!
